A message from the Provost


I am pleased to inform you that Dr. Valgene L. Dunham has accepted our invitation to join Coastal as dean of the School of Natural and Applied Sciences and professor of biology, effective July 1, 1995.

Dr. Dunham has achieved a distinguished career as a teacher, a scholar, and an academic administrator. He has served as professor and head of the Department of Biology at Western Kentucky University, since 1985 and was a member of the faculty at the State University of New York, College at Fredonia from 1973 to 1985, and spent four years (1969-1973) as a post-doctoral research associate at Purdue University. Prior to entering graduate school to pursue a Ph.D. in botany at Syracuse University, Dr. Dunham was a high school science teacher in Marcellus, New York. He

received the State University of New York Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching in 1979, has delivered invited research lectures in the United Kingdom (1980-1981) and in China (1990) and has received numerous instructional and research grants for projects directed toward work with undergraduates.

I anticipate that Dr. Dunham's varied experiences will be of assistance to us all as we work together to advance Coastal Carolina University. I know you will join me in welcoming him upon his arrival at Coastal.

I appreciate the interest and hard work of so many of you, particularly the Search Committee, that helped contribute to the successful conclusion of the search process. ♦



W. Cecil Brandon Jr. receives Jason Ammons Free Enterprise Award

The E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration and Computer Science has awarded area business leader W. Cecil Brandon Jr. with the Jason Ammons Free Enterprise Award.

Since 1990, the Wall School of Business has given the award to select individuals whose career achievements exemplify the limitless opportunities within the American free enterprise system. The award is named in memory of Jason Ammons, a Myrtle Beach businessman. Scholarships totalling \$2,000 also are awarded through the Jason Ammons Free Enterprise Project.

President Ingle presented the award to Brandon, a man who he said typifies entrepreneurship. Brandon, who knew Jason Ammons well, said the award was heartwarming. "Jason Ammons loved this community and I do, too."

After serving in the U.S. Army as a First Lieutenant in the Korean War, Brandon was graduated from Davidson College in 1957 with a bachelor's degree in business. He moved to Myrtle Beach in 1959 and became a partner in his father-in-law's company. He became president and owner of the business which is now called Brandon Advertising and Sales Company.

In 1967, Brandon founded Myrtle Beach Golf Holiday; he is executive director of the organization.

Brandon is a member of several boards including the Council of Myrtle Beach Area Organizations, Anchor Bank Financial Corporation and the Myrtle Beach National Company. He is a member of the Chicora Rotary Club and an elder of the First Presbyterian Church of Myrtle Beach. In 1982, Brandon was appointed by Congressman Robin Tallon to serve on the Congressional Tourism and Caucus Advisory Board.

Brandon is the 1994 recipient of the Myrtle Beach Area Chamber of Commerce Citizen of the Year Award. He received the award for his role in attracting the Senior PGA Tour Championship to Myrtle Beach. In 1982, Brandon was awarded the South Carolina Tourism Award for his success in attracting visitors to the state.

The Jason Ammons award is presented during the annual Business Forum which is a series of programs dealing with topics of interest to the business community, students and faculty. Traditionally, forum speakers have represented some of the world's largest and most successful enterprises. "Business Forum 1995: The Future" was held March 20 through 23 at Coastal and attracted more than 300 business leaders and Coastal students, faculty and administrators. ♦

Continuing students may register for Summer Session II through Thursday, July 7. Classes begin Monday, July 10. New students may register for Summer Session II beginning July 5. ♦

Bills that are not paid by Aug. 14 will result in the cancellation of course schedules.

information, contact the Office of Admissions at extension 2026. New students will register for classes during their selected Orientation session. Orientation dates are: June 26 to 27, July 10 to 11, July 17 to 18, and Aug. 21 to 22.

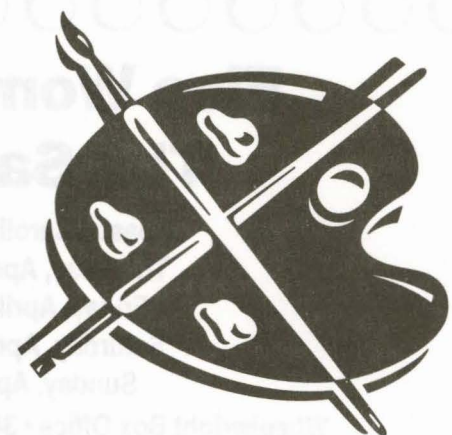
Department of Art sponsors Senior Art Show

Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder videoconference

The Office of Continuing Education will present a two-hour interactive videoconference, *Why Can't Bobby Pay Attention: Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder*, followed by a one-hour local discussion on Thursday, April 20 from 1 to 4 p.m. in Admissions 003. Coastal faculty, staff and students may attend the videoconference for \$10. Single registration fee for the public is \$35; two or more participants may register together at a discounted rate of \$25 each. Early registration is recommended.

This interactive videoconference and discussion group is designed to give those who work with children, including parents, an opportunity to discuss proper diagnosis of ADHD; other factors in hyperactivity; medical and behavioral treatments; support services; and strategies for home and classroom. The seminar will include a national satellite broadcast featuring experts on ADHD. Participants will hear up-to-date information, get answers to commonly asked questions about coping with and treating ADHD, and have an opportunity to call in questions to the national on-air panel.

The national on-air panel will include Dr. Anthony L. Rostain, professor of psychiatry and pediatrics and director of medical student education at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine; Harvey C. Parker, director of the Counseling Care Center located in south Florida who is well known for his publications about attention deficit disorders for parents, children and teachers; Dr. James C. Penrod, a pediatrician in private practice in Florida, chairman of the Florida Pediatrics Society's Committee on Nutrition, and an adjunct faculty member at Florida State University; and Casey W. Schmidt, a psychology supervisor in child clinical psychology at Florida State University's Multidisciplinary Evaluation and Counseling Center.

Following the nationally broadcast program, a local discussion will be led by Sandra Lee and Rebecca Kasperek, both faculty members in Coastal's School of Education.

Coastal Carolina People in the News

Richard Dame has been named president of the Southeastern Estuarine Research Society. SEERS involves estuarine (coastal tidal waters) scientists from North and South Carolina, Georgia and Florida. The group meets three times every other year and is part of a parent organization, the Estuarine Research Federation (ERF). As president of SEERS, Dame represents the southeastern area of the country on the ERF governing board. Dame also was the keynote speaker at The Netherlands Society of Aquatic Ecology meeting held recently in Wageningen. He spoke on the role of bivalves in estuarine ecosystem research and potential future avenues for investigation. He also presented a paper at the meeting on the funding and support of ecosystem research in the United States and was asked to serve on a doctoral committee at the University of Wageningen. Dame also attended a meeting at the Division of Tidal Waters in Middelburg.

Janet Files conducted a workshop at the South Carolina Council Teachers of English Conference held in Myrtle Beach, March 12 to 24. The workshop was titled "Creating Community Through Literature." Files and **Sara Sanders** also hosted a round-table seminar for college level teachers of English at the conference. The round-table seminar, "Sharing Our Best Practice," was sponsored by the Center of Excellence in Composition and the Coastal Area Writing Project.

Eva Fuchs presented a paper, "Damaged Goods: Concealment and Self-Revelation in George Eliot's *The Mill on the Floss*," at the annual meeting of the Philological Association of the Carolinas held at UNC Asheville, March 17 to 19.

Susan Libes has been named as a candidate for The Douglass Society which is the highest honor for the most distinguished graduates of Douglass College, which is located in New Brunswick, N.J. Libes will be inducted into the society on the Douglass campus in April 1995. Libes was

selected as a candidate because of her "outstanding and diverse contributions as a highly respected woman scientist in the field of marine chemistry and as an environmental activist." Libes is the founding program director of the university's Environmental Quality Laboratory, which is certified by SC DHEC and the USEPA. She was named Land Conservationist of the Year in 1992 by the South Carolina Wildlife Federation. Libes has written numerous articles including research pieces on nitrogen chemistry and a textbook on marine chemistry; she has won awards for her efforts as an environmental journalist.

Trelee MacAnn's artwork, *Moonlight Reunion*, won an Honorable Mention Award in the 1995 Festive Juried Art Exhibition held recently in Greenville, S.C. More than 400 entries were submitted from 152 artists in the South. MacAnn's artwork also was accepted to be included in the 1995 Maine Maritime Flatworks Exhibition held at the University of Maine at Presque Isle.

Betsy Puskar has been chosen to receive the 1995 Indiana University of Pennsylvania distinguished alumni award for service. The award is the highest honor accorded to the university's alumni, one that only 165 alumni out of more than 75,000 have received.

Sara Sanders and **Linda Hollandsworth** have had their article, "U.S. Professors Retrain Russian Teachers and Learn about Russian Soul," published in the March 1995 issue of *Connections*, a USIA educational publication distributed throughout Russia.

Susan Shepherd has been elected the 1995-1996 president of the South Carolina Sociological Association. SCSA is a statewide organization of sociology faculty from universities, colleges, community colleges and technical colleges. Sociologists in federal, state and local governments, non-profit agencies and private businesses also comprise the organization. ♦

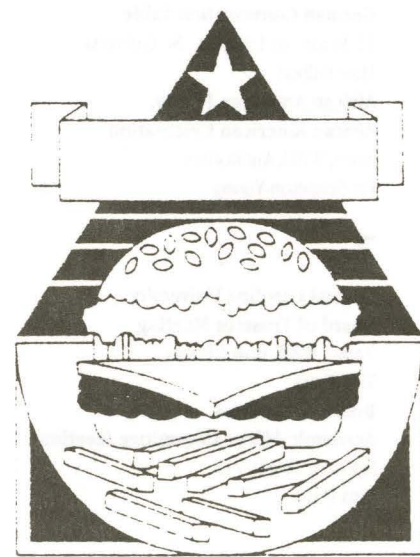
