RICHARDSON TO COACH AT COASTAL CAROLINA

Former Yankee baseball player, Bobby Richardson, has been appointed baseball coach and athletic director for USC-Coastal Carolina College. Dr. Fred W. Hicks, chancellor of Coastal, made the appointment Wednesday morning at a news conference on the campus.

Born in Sumter, S. C., Richardson was educated in local public schools and joined the Yankees after high school. He retired from professional baseball at the age of 31, becoming a pro-scout for the Yankees for three years. Richardson served as head coach for the University of South Carolina from 1970-1976.

Dr. Hicks said, "Bobby Richardson's magnetism and leadership abilities will be the greatest catalyst to the growth of athletics in Coastal Carolina College history. His contributions to college life, college athletics and the community will surely demonstrate that Coastal is serious about developing citizens and athletes of character and athletic prowess."

Coach Richardson joins Coastal after a successful baseball season in which the Chanticleers placed fourth in the Small-College World Series, played recently in Idaho.

Richardson currently does public relations work for Sports Illustrated and Chick-Fil-A food chain. He also assists in development for Ben Lippen School in Asheville, N. C. and Columbia Bible College. He serves on the Development Board of Taylor University in Indiana and Keswick Rehibilitation Center in New Jersey.

He has served as Deacon and Elder-Chairman of his local Church and as associate secretary for the Aurora Foundation, a support organization for Christian ministries in Bradenton, Florida.

Richardson and his wife Betsy have five children.

USING TAX STRATEGIES CAN HELP WITH COLLEGE COSTS

The American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), in cooperation with the accounting firm of Coopers & Lybrand, this week published a 40-page booklet that outlines a number of financial planning techniques, including the use of tax shelters, that can help middle-income parents provide for their children's college educations.

Allan W. Ostar, president of AASCU, says the booklet, Early Planning for College Costs: A Guide for Parents, is designed to "help meet the needs of parents who fear they might not be able to afford to send their children to college."

Ostar notes that for most middle-income parents, the cost of college educations for their children is rapidly becoming an overwhelming financial burden. "While tuition and fees are increasing, student financial assistance programs are being drastically reduced, especially for children of middle-income parents," Ostar says. "In addition, borrowing money through student loan programs often means that college graduates must begin their careers saddled with thousands of dollars in debts," he adds.

To try to help families meet future college expenses, AASCU asked Coopers & Lybrand to prepare the guide, which addresses the question of how middle-income parents can, while their children are still relatively young, use creative tax strategies to add money to college funds for their children.

"As the guidebook points out," Ostar notes, "it is never too early to begin saving for future college costs." "However," he says, "setting up college funds at any time can make an appreciable difference in paying college costs, and the booklet explains how to take advantage of tax laws to add money to those funds."
