Clemson University President Philip H. Prince will deliver the

commencement address.

Prince was named the 12th president of Clemson University Sept. 30, 1994. Prince has a long history of support for higher education through years of service as a member of the Clemson University Board of Trustees and the Clemson University Foundation Board of Directors.

Prince has been self-employed from 1985 to 1994 as a business consultant/investor based in Mount Pleasant, S.C. He was president and vice president of Synco Properties in Charlotte, N.C. from 1983 to 1985; senior vice president of the American Express Company in New York from 1978 to 1983; and vice president of Milliken and Company of Spartanburg from 1967 to 1978.

Prince earned a bachelor's degree from Clemson University in 1949. He has undertaken graduate studies at Columbia University-NYC School of General Studies, King College in Bristol, Tenn., and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill's Executive Program. He will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Public Service.

Catherine Heniford Lewis served as the head librarian for the Horry County Memorial Library for 27 years, from 1960 to 1987. She was librarian at Coastal Carolina Junior College in 1958 to 1960. Lewis also was reviewer and bibliographer for the U.S. Information Agency, assistant librarian for the School of Advanced International Studies in Washington, D.C., and bibliographer for the Library of Congress Copyright Office.

Lewis is a member of the board of directors of Pee Dee Heritage Center. She has been a lecturer at Coastal and has served as chair of the board of directors of Playcard Environmental Education Center.

The South Carolina State Library presented Lewis with its Distinguished Service Award in 1987. Lewis received the Community Award of Merit from Coastal Carolina College in 1984, and the institution named her an Honorary Founder in 1990. In 1993, she received the Waccamaw Award in recognition of distinguished contributions to the study of Southern history from what is now Coastal's Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies. She also has received the Ernest Edward Richardson Award for service to the Horry

County Historical Society, and the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc., Award. Lewis received the *Field and Herald* Woman of the Year Award for the first time in 1973, and again in 1982.

Lewis received a bachelor's degree in English and Latin

from Coker College in 1943, a master's degree in English from the University of North Carolina in 1945, and a bachelor's degree in library science from the University of North Carolina in 1948.

Lewis lives in Conway.

Lewis will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters.

R. Cathcart Smith was appointed by former Gov. Carroll D. Campbell Jr. to serve as a member of the first Board of Trustees of Coastal Carolina University, a position he held from July 1993 until March 1995. As part of his more than 40 years of service to Coastal, Smith also was a founder and first president of the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. At the state level, he was vice chair of the South Carolina Board of Education. He was a member of the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education from 1971 to 1978; he served as chair of the commission from 1972 to 1978.

A retired physician, Smith received a bachelor's degree from The Citadel in 1935, and was graduated from Duke Medical University in 1939. In 1975, Smith received the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from the University of South Carolina. In 1977, he received the honorary degree of Doctor of Science from The Citadel.

In 1985, Smith opened Baskervill Medical Clinic in Pawleys Island to serve the medically indigent of the Waccamaw Neck area.

In 1978, Smith received the Order of the Palmetto, which was established in 1970 by former Gov. John West to recognize distinguished individuals for outstanding service to the state.

Smith lives in Murrells Inlet. Smith will receive the honorary degree of

Doctor of Public Service.

Freeman receives Distinguished Professor Emeritus title

Retired faculty member Carl J. Freeman Jr. has been named Distinguished Professor Emeritus. Freeman retired in December after almost 25 years of service to the institution. The Board of Trustees approved the honorary title for Freeman at its April 7 meeting.

Freeman joined the Coastal faculty in 1970 as an instructor of biology. He served as assistant dean of the School of Natural and Applied Sciences from 1988 to 1994. He also was pre-medical adviser and Allied Health Science adviser. Freeman is a 1973-1974 Amoco Outstanding Teacher of the Year Award recipient.

According to Betsy Puskar, there are many Coastal science graduates who attribute their success to

Carl Freeman. "He fundamentally guided each student through the trials and tribulations of applying to medical school, many of whom return to Coastal to see Dr. Freeman and thank him for his advice and support."

Freeman received a Ph.D. in biology from the University of South Carolina in 1974, a master's degree in biology from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1963, and a bachelor's degree in biology from the University of Virginia in 1960. Before coming to Coastal, Freeman taught at several colleges and universities including Virginia Polytechnic Institute, Presbyterian College, Converse College and the University of South Carolina.

He lives in Conway. ◆

## Students awarded for academic achievement at Honors Convocation

The university honored student academic achievement during the annual Honors Convocation held Tuesday, April 25.

The Faculty's Academic Excellence Award recognizes outstanding academic achievement by a senior student. Selected by a faculty committee with representatives from each school of the university, candidates for this award must attain a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.5, the endorsement of a faculty adviser, and a record of academic honors throughout their enrollment at Coastal.

The 1994-1995 Faculty's Academic Excellence Award recipient is Melissa Keller. Keller is a marine science major from Cincinnati, Ohio. She recently received an award for her presentation at the South Carolina Academy of Sciences meeting in Greenville, S.C. She is a member of Sigma Zeta Beta Mu national honor society for science and mathematics; Pi Mu Epsilon national honor society for mathematics; and Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities. Keller has been on the president's and dean's academic honor lists at Coastal. She has been awarded several scholarships including the Santee Cooper Environmental Scholarship, Nelson Scholarship and the Cincinnati Scholarship Foundation. Keller has been a student government representative and fishing club member. She has volunteered with Coastal's sedimental lab and participated in research expeditions on the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration research ship Ferrel. She works in Coastal's environmental quality lab and the Center for Marine and Wetland Studies.

The Ronald D. Lackey Service Award, named in honor of a retired faculty member and university chaplain, is given to a senior on the basis of conspicuous service to the university through involvement and leadership in campus organizations. Jennifer Agresta, a political science major from Wheeling, W.Va., was presented the Ronald D. Lackey Service Award. Agresta is a member of Alpha Mu Gamma foreign language honor society; Phi Alpha Delta pre-law fraternity; Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities; and varsity cheerleader captain. She has been on the dean's academic honor list and is a member of Omicron Delta Kappa leadership honor society; serving as secretary of the organization during the 1993-1994 academic year. Agresta has volunteered at the Horry County Shelter Home.

The Coastal Educational Foundation Distinguished Teaching Award recognizes faculty who have demonstrated excellence in teaching. A student committee solicits nominations from students. Top candidates then receive classroom visitations and are interviewed by the committee. The Distinguished Teaching Award was presented to Linda P. Hollandsworth. An associate professor of English, Hollandsworth joined the Coastal faculty in 1985. She received a Ph.D. in English in 1990 from the Indiana University of Pennsylvania, a master's degree in humanities in 1978 from Hollins College in Roanoke, Va., and a bachelor's degree in theater and speech in 1969 from Greensboro College in Greensboro, N.C. She also is the university's NCAA faculty representative.

The Student Affairs Division Award honors faculty who have made significant contributions to the quality of student life through participation and leadership in the co-curricular activities of the university. #### New dean named for School of Natural and Applied Sciences

President Ingle has named Valgene L. Dunham dean of the School of Natural and Applied Sciences, effective July 1, 1995.

Dunham has been a professor of biology and head of the Department of Biology at Western Kentucky University in Bowling Green, Ky. since 1985. He served at the State University of New York, College at Fredonia, from 1973 to 1985 in several capacities including professor of biology, chair of the biology department, research associate in the Environmental Resources Center, and coordinator of the recombinant gene technology program. He was an honorary lecturer in plant biochemistry at University College in the United Kingdom from 1980 to 1981.

Western Kentucky University is a regional statesupported institution. Approximately 14,500 students choose from 52 programs of study with degrees offered at the baccalaureate and master levels.

Dunham has received numerous grants,

fellowships and honors for his contributions to higher education. In 1990, he was a guest lecturer at the East China University of Chemical Technology in Shanghai. He received the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching at the State University of New York in 1979.

Dunham received a Ph.D. in botany in 1969 and a master's degree in general science in 1965, both from Syracuse University. He received a bachelor's degree in general science in 1965 from Houghton College in Houghton, N.Y. Dunham conducted post-doctoral research from 1969 to 1973 at Purdue University.
