Spivey gift funds ornithology professorship and scholarship

Franklin H. and Virginia M. Spivey of Myrtle Beach have established a professorship and scholarship at Coastal Carolina University through the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. to promote the advancement of the study of ornithology.

The Franklin H. and Virginia M. Spivey Palmetto Professorship in Ornithology promotes the advancement of the study of ornithology by supporting research that focuses on birds, the development and teaching of ornithology classes, undergraduate assistants conducting ornithological studies, and other projects that are not provided through institutional budgets such as field study, equipment, travel and other activities.

The Franklin H. and Virginia M. Spivey Ornithology Scholarship is designed to encourage student interest in ornithology. Scholarship applicants must be full time Coastal students who demonstrate an interest in the study of ornithology and have taken or are enrolled in appropriate ornithology courses.

When the Spiveys retired from Reliance Electric Company in Charlotte in 1981, they decided to make Myrtle Beach their new home – largely because there was a university close by where they could pursue intellectual endeavors.

The Spiveys are members of the Waccamaw Chapter of the National Audubon Society and the Winyah Chapter of the Sierra Club. They volunteer at Chapin Library and have volunteered at Brookgreen Gardens.

Chris Marsh, a Coastal biology professor who met the Spiveys 11 years ago through the Waccamaw Chapter of the National Audubon Society, which holds its monthly meetings at the university, describes the couple as avid students and bird lovers.

"Frank and Virginia are energetic volunteers and eternal students who are committed to education for people of all ages," Marsh said.

The Spiveys credit Marsh for generating their interest in birds. "We were interested in birds from the

birdfeeder end only," Frank Spivey said. "Through his energy and teaching expertise, Chris inspired us and gave us more exposure to birds."

According to Frank Spivey, birding is not for pleasure alone – he learned about environmental factors that influence birds and these effects on human beings.

In 1992, the Spiveys purchased and donated to Kimbel Library a forthcoming educational series that describes more than 700 species of North American birds.

According to Marsh, in addition to ornithology classes, the university offers several educational opportunities for those interested in birds. Participants take field trips locally to places such as Huntington Beach State Park and plantations along the Santee Delta. Marsh and area physician Reg Daves lead week-long birding expeditions annually to areas known for diverse, exotic birdlife such as Southern Texas and Southeastern Arizona.

In 1986, the Spiveys, along with 10 other charter members, helped start a Bird Study Fund at Coastal where donors contribute to support Coastal's undergraduate ornithology studies. The fund helps to support research programs for undergraduates, maintain Coastal's museum collection and provide educational outreach bird conservation programs for Horry and Georgetown county public school students. The Spivey endowments are an offshoot of this support fund and a lasting reminder of their commitment to education.

The Spiveys said they want to help others enjoy what they have enjoyed. "Education is an ongoing process – to get involved you have to get involved," Frank Spivey said.

According to Valgene Dunham, dean of the school of Natural and Applied Sciences, a search has been initiated for a faculty member who will develop a program in ornithology with an emphasis in molecular ecology. The person selected will be expected to establish an active research program with undergraduates and participate in and support ornithological activities in the community. ♦

S.C. Sea Grant Consortium

Coastal Carolina University has been approved as a full member of the S.C. Sea Grant Consortium, effective January 1996.

The consortium began in the 1960s as a federal program to create an alliance of educational institutions to work together to sustain coastal resources through research, education and extension programs in South Carolina and the region. Coastal has been involved with the consortium since its inception by virtue of its former affiliation with the University of South Carolina.

As a full member, Coastal will have all the rights and responsibilities of current members, including a voting position on the board.

The consortium is composed of several member institutions including: The Citadel, Medical University of South Carolina, S.C. Department of Natural Resources, University of South Carolina, University of Charleston, Clemson University, and S.C. State University.

Philip H. Prince, president emeritus of Clemson University, is chair of the group.

The board unanimously approved Coastal's petition for full membership.

According to President Ingle, consortium membership recognizes Coastal's commitment to research education and environmental concern. "Our deeper involvement with the consortium will allow Coastal to play an active leadership role in South Carolina coastal management in the future," he said.

Theatreworks USA to perform classic *The Little Prince*

Professional touring group Theatreworks/USA will perform *The Little Prince*, a children's musical adapted from a novel by Antoine de Saint-Exupery, on Tuesday, Nov. 21 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium as part of the 1995-1996 Wheelwright Series. Tickets are \$10, \$5 for students. Admission is free for an adult accompanied by a child.

The Little Prince unfolds as a dazzling, magical and wondrous story of love, friendship and imagination. The production is a delightful and memorable adventure that will captivate elementary school children and the whole family.

In the play, a prince leaves his tiny planet to search for the secret of what is really important. He journeys to many planets in the galaxy and finally lands in the middle of the Sahara, where he meets an aviator stranded 1,000 miles from help after a plane crash. "Draw me a sheep," the little prince demands and with this mystifying request he tells his remarkable story.

The book and lyrics are by Arthur Perlman;

music is by Jeffrey Lunden.

New York-based Theatreworks/USA began in 1961 and now has a repertory of almost 75 plays and musicals created by noted playwrights, composers and lyricists. The group has helped launch the careers of actors such as Henry Winkler, Judy Kuhn, Academy Award winner F. Murray Abraham and three-time Tony Award winner Jerry Zaks. Performing at home in New York and touring across the country in theaters, arts centers, schools and museums, the group has presented more than 30,000 performances to more than 25 million people in 49 states, with an annual audience of close to 3 million.

Eight hundred students from seven Horry County schools will see the performance during a special matinee on Tuesday.

This program is funded, in part, by the Horry Cultural Arts Council and the South Carolina Arts Commission, which receive support from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Horry County Accommodations Tax Advisory Committee.

The performance is presented by the Wheelwright Council for the Arts.

The keynote speaker is Michael W. Kaufman, founder of Humanities at Work, a creative development program for professionals. The conference is co-sponsored by the Department of English and the Office of Continuing Education.

The conference is designed for literature professors, teachers, business executives and those interested in literature studies that serve as case studies for leaders. Selective works of literature will be examined to help those in leadership roles resolve ethical dilemmas.

Coastal's fishing invitational still a success

It's been a slow year for king mackerel fishermen on the South Carolina coast. Smaller and fewer fish have been reported from both sport and commercial fishermen. The results of the 22nd annual Coastal Carolina Invitational, an intercollegiate fishing match and seminar held recently out of Murrells Inlet, confirmed the bad reports.

Fishing out of Captain Dick's Marina, students from Clemson, Francis Marion, the University of South Carolina Medical School and Coastal Carolina University caught 24 kings. Although this was easily the best headboat catch of the year, the total number of fish caught using drifted live cigar minnows and Spanish sardines was down by half from previous tournaments.

Capt. Jack Orr apologized for the slow fishing, but the student anglers were pleased with the results. "I was just happy to catch my first king and see a lot of other big fish," one student said.

Lecture and demonstration on early musical instruments

The Music Educator's National Conference Club will sponsor a lecture and demonstration on early musical instruments presented by area musician Bob Lauer on Wednesday, Nov. 29 at 1:30 p.m. in ADM 005. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Lauer plays first clarinet and is assistant conductor for the Grand Strand Concert Band. He was one of the first musicians to receive a teaching certificate from the American Recorder Society, which was founded in 1939 and is made up of professional musicians, music teachers, musicologists and amateur musicians in an effort to promote the appreciation of the recorder and its literature.

The one-hour presentations and workshops will include fields of literature or other literary work that apply to leadership, such as "Can the Idealist Make It: A Man for All Seasons," and "Billy Budd and the Boss."

"Considering the horrible weather we've had all fall, we were fortunate just to get out," said Donald Kelly, coach of the Francis Marion team. "Everyone enjoyed the fishing and learned from the seminar," he said. This was Kelly's 20th Invitational since 1974. ♦
