- A) Dr. Richard Kester has been named coordinator of interdisciplinary studies. Dr. Kester, an associate professor of biology, has been with USC-Coastal Carolina College since 1979.
- B) Dr. Subhash Saxena is participating and presenting a talk at the Fifth International Congress on Mathematical Education (ICME 5), which will be held at Adelaide, Australia through August 30.

Dr. Saxena is a professor of mathematics and computer science at USC-Coastal Carolina College. He will speak on "In Search Of An Ideal Product for School Mathematics in the 21st Century." The professor said that with computers in the classroom, there will be significant changes in the way math is taught.

"The mathematics that we learn will not change, but the way we learn it will," Dr. Saxena said. "Math drills will be reduced and the emphasis will be on problem solving. Once a student is taught to add long columns of numbers, he can use a calculator and move to more advanced mathematics at a younger age."

The purpose of the Fifth International Congress is to advance the learning of mathematics in all its facets. The program has been designed to lead to as much international cooperation as possible, Dr. Saxena said.

- C) Thomas E. Jones, chairman of the Department of Theatre and Speech, School of Humanities at Coastal Carolina College, recently returned from Florida where he visited theatre groups in performance. He represented the Grand Strand Theatre Series.
