LEGISLATION

The U.S. Senate has unanimously passed the House version of the legislation extending Section 127 of the Internal Revenue Code, the Employee Educational Assistance Act (H.R. 2568). The bill goes to the President, and no veto is expected. The legislation, made retroactive to Jan. 1, 1984 and extended through Dec. 31, 1985, adds a \$5,000 cap on the amount of educational benefits for which an employee can be tax exempt. No Social Security (FICA) taxes will be levied on the educational benefits under \$5,000. Over that amount, the employee will be expected to pay federal, state and FICA taxes on the educational benefits, except for teaching and research staff of educational institutions who are exempt from the 5,000 cap.
