WINTER CAMPING

A winter camping trip to Mt. Rogers in the Appalachian Mountains of southwestern Virginia will be Dec. 15-21. Registration deadline is Nov. 15. Participants must be at least 16 years old, capable of running 20 minutes daily, and carry a 50-70 lb. pack for six hours each day. The cost is \$175 per person and \$150 for students. This includes everything but personal items and hiking boots. Mt. Rogers is a 5,700-foot peak topped with a spruce-fir forest and grassy meadows. Deer and wild goats are in abundance. OPEN ENROLLMENT

Personnel Services announces that during the month of November there will be an Open Enrollment for the Insurance program. This Open Enrollment will include changes in the HEATH INSURANCE and the OPTIONAL LIFE PROGRAMS.

During this time employees may change the health insurance in order to:

- 1. Add eligible dependents.
- 2. Change plans of coverage.
- 3. Add dependent life coverage.
- 4. Delete coverage or dependents, or re duce benefits.
- 5. Change addresses, names, and beneficiaries missed throughout the year.

Also, an employee may make changes in the Optional Life program:

- 1. If the salary level has changed during the past year to a new qualifying level, the employee may change without evidence of insurability provided they are presently insured at the maximum.
- 2. Enroll for the program if they refused coverage initially by providing Medical Evidence of Insurability.
- 3. Increase coverage to a new level if enrolled below the maximum by providing Medical Evidence of Insurability.

All changes must be made through Personnel Services, Room 121, EMS Building.

The Edward Albee play, <u>Seascape</u>, will be performed Nov. 9–11 in Wheelwright Auditorium. The play, which will be the college's entry in the American College Theatre Festival XVII, also will be performed the following weekend at Converse College in Spartanburg. The play is about a middle-age couple sharing a picnic on the beach and discussing home and family when they are joined by two sea creatures. The sea creatures, contemplating the possibility of life out of water, have urgent questions that the couple try to answer. The Friday and Saturday performances are at 8 p.m. and the Sunday performance is at 2:30 p.m.

- (b) Veronica G. Davis, assistant professor of English, recently presented a paper at the Mid-Atlantic Writers' Conference in Washington, D.C. Her topic was "Folklore in the Writing of Julia Peterkin: A Need for Preservation." - (d) A print by Zdzislaw R. Sikora, associate professor of art, has been accepted for exhibition in the "7th Hawaii National Print Exhibition." The jurors were Ron Kowalke, Pritwish Neogy and Joseph Feher. The exhibit runs March 7- April 7 at the Honolulu Academy of Arts, Honolulu, Hawaii.
- (e) Zdzilaw Sikora recently delivered a slide lecture on the development of his work to the members of the North Carolina Print and Drawing Society at the Arts and Sciences Council of North Carolina. He also addressed approximately 150 students from the University of North Carolina-Charlotte and Central Piedmont Community College on the preparatory drawings and methods of drawing in his work. He also demonstrated simple colour intanglio methods and the more complex use of colour in his prints.

CHANCELLOR HICKS ACCEPTS STATE AWARD FOR "INNOVATIVE PROGRAM"

Dr. Fred W. Hicks, chancellor of USC Coastal Carolina College, has accepted an award for the most innovative program in higher education in South Carolina. The award, presented Thursday at a luncheon of the South Carolina Association of Higher Continuing Education meeting in Columbia, was given for Coastal's "College After 25" program, a plan for recruiting older students developed by Audrey Garland of the Department of Continuing Education.

The "College After 25" program is sponsored by the college Office of Continuing Education. Dr. Sally Hare, assistant chancellor for academic affairs, said more than 79 students have participated in the program so far this year. She said the focus of the program is to "orient students who've been away from an academic setting, and to offer help and encouragement as they pursue careers or seek to enrich their personal lives through education."

She said the format of the program gives returning students an opportunity to meet one another and to talk informally with faculty and administrators before taking classes.

The next "College After 25" programs are planned for Georgetown Nov. 26, at 6 p.m. in the Georgetown Education Center, and Dec. 3 at 6 p.m. on the Coastal campus in the Student Center. Programs are free.
