DEADLINE NEARS FOR FREE DENTAL COVERAGE BLUE CROSS OPEN ENROLLMENT

Personnel Services reports that very few members of the faculty and staff have signed the Notice of Election to begin covering their families for the new dental plan. The coverage for the employee is free and no action is required of the employee if employee coverage is desired, unless an employee was hired after Oct. 1, 1984. If coverage is desired for the spouse or spouse and children, then a Notice of Election must be completed. The deadline is nearing and Personnel Services urges interested people to call the office if there are any questions. Blue Cross/Blue Shield and State's Optional open enrollment is for the month of November ONLY. During November, you may add eligible dependents, change plans of coverage, add dependent life coverage, delete coverage or dependents, or reduce benefits and change addresses, names and beneficiaries missed throughout the year.

FACULTY/STAFF

Dr. Robert Squatriglia spoke to the Fifth Annual Charter Night Banquet of Sigma Phi Epsilon Social Fraternity on Nov. 10. His topic was: "Five Keys to Successful Living."

Dr. Cynthia Terres gave the keynote address to the Alabama Association for Counseling and Development's state convention in Montgomery, Ala. on Nov. 15. Her topic was: "People Helping People: Counseling Today for Tomorrow."

Dr. Doug Nelson of the marine science department recently attended the annual meeting of the Carolina Geologic Society in Albemarle, N.C. The meeting included a two-day field trip examining rocks of the Piedmont.

Coastal Carolina College Chancellor Fred W. Hicks spoke to the Myrtle Beach Sertoma Club on Tuesday, Nov. 13 at its weekly meeting at Mary Juel's restaurant. He spoke on "The College and Its Role in the Political Life of South Carolina."

Thomas E. Jones, chairman of the Department of Theatre and Speech in The School of Humanities, recently returned from the 1984 Convention of the South Carolina Theatre Association that was held at Converse College in Spartanburg. Jones serves on the South Carolina Theatre Association Board of Directors and has been active with the organization the past five years. Last year, the Theatre Association held its annual convention here at Coastal Carolina College and Jones was in charge of the convention.

Dr. Joseph Pinson spoke recently at the Bradford Village Community Lecture Series in Santee, S.C. He spoke on the flora of Carolina Bays in the Low Country of South Carolina. The professor of biology also gave a slide presentation, described flora unique to the bays and reported data pertaining to possible origins of the Carolina Bays.

Dr. Christopher Marsh, assistant professor of biology and marine sciences, gave a seminar entitled "The impact of avian predators on an Oregon rocky intertidal community" to the Department of Marine Sciences at USC-Columbia on Friday, Nov. 16.

Dr. Anne Graves had a paper accepted at the South Carolina Council of Exceptional Children for its February Conference. The paper is on "Direct Instruction Training for Educationally Handicapped." Also, Dr. Graves had a paper accepted for the National Council of Exceptional Children Conference in Anaheim, Ca. in April. The paper is entitled "Direct Instruction vs. Ecrie Applications for Teachers."

Dr. Tom Cooke conducted a three hour clinic November 14 on "Nutrition and Health Through Exercise" for 23 elementary students. The clinic was held in the Human Performance Lab in the Williams-Brice building. Dr. Cooke also took part in the parent volunteer program at Conway High School for American Education week, and presented a demonstration and talk for Conway Elementary School on "Obesity and How It Hurts Your Health."
