DEPENDENTS' SCHOLARSHIP

The Faculty/Staff Dependents' Scholarship application deadline is Feb. 15. The scholarship is open to any dependent or spouse of a full-time slotted University of South Carolina system employee. To be eligible, applicants must be enrolled, or accepted for enrollment, as a full-time undergraduate, graduate, or professional student on one of the university's nine campuses and predict, or have attained, a minimum 3.0 Grade Point Average. The scholarship is renewable for up to four years for students pursuing baccalaureate degrees, provided the recipient maintains a 3.0 GPR. BUILDING TEMPERATURE

To evaluate and adjust the college's HVAC systems, a comfort range has been established. During the heating season, the average temperature should fall within the 66-71 F. degree range, with exception of the Library Building. If your office or classroom does not fall within the specified range, please complete a Maintenance Service request form stating the room and approximate temperature, adjustments will be made as quickly as possible. A portion of the newly renovated offices does not have HVAC supplied heat. These offices may need to be heated by portable heaters. However, South Carolina Fire code prohibits the use of portable heaters in state buildings. All faculty and staff who have HVAC access are requested to remove all portable heaters as soon as possible.
