JEHAN SADAT WILL TEACH USC COURSE

Jehan Sadat, wife of the late Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, will teach "Women in Egyptian Culture," during the spring semester, 1985 at the University of South Carolina. The course will meet on Monday afternoons from 2-5 p.m. for three credit hours. The course is primarily for juniors, seniors, graduate students, and special students. Freshman and sophomore students may register for the course on the written recommendation of a faculty member, chairman or dean. To register for HSSI 500X, present a signed advisement form to Pam Young, Gambrell Hall, Room 251, to complete the registration. A term paper will be required along with other assignments made by the instructor. The following subjects will be discussed:

- the position of women in the Arab World
- the history of the movement for emancipation of women in Egypt
- the role of Egyptian women in the struggle for independence
- the status of women under Islamic law
- the role of women in development: family planning, anti-illiteracy, etc.
- the Egyptian woman in the professions
- the role of women for the establishment of peace
- women's political rights in Egypt
- women and education
- women and employment
- women in rural areas
