TACTICAL ANNUAL BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Tactical Annual Budget Committee met Jan. 23 and agreed that its purpose would be to provide the chancellor with a comprehensive assessment of the college's fiscal needs and goals for both academic and hon-academic areas. The committee is charged to make recommendations and not decisions. The assessments include evaluating cost-center budgets; the cost-effectiveness of on-going and proposed programs; and personnel distributions.

FACULTY/STAFF

MARSHALL PARKER recently made a presentation to the Myrtle Beach Retirement Club on the importance of exercise at any age. He discussed ways to improve flexibility, strength, stamina, and ways to improve overall health through stress management, proper nutrition, and weight control. Dr. Parker also discussed Coastal Carolina's new program ABLE, which means "A Better Lifestyle Experience." ABLE improves the health fitness of people over 50 years of age. More than 100 people attended the presentation.

- -"Determinants of Changes in Household Time Allocation: The Inclusion of Purchasing Power Variable" will be presented at the Mid-South Academy of Economists Annual Convention in Shreveport, La., during February.
- "Career Paths of Students Trained in Economics" and "Influential Factors in Farm Household Financial Management" will be presented at the Easter Economics Association Annual Convention in Pittsburgh during March. The "career paths" topic was co-authored with Elaine D. Scott, University of Vermont. The "farm financial management" paper was co-authored with Scott and Esther M. Maddux, University of Georgia—Athens.

JEFFCOTT, instructional tutor in the English lab and assistant to Coastal's program coordinator at Myrtle Beach Air Force Base, was notified that her poem, "Alone," was selected for publication by World Anthology of Poetry.
