INTERDISCIPLINARY CONFERENCE

An Interdisciplinary Conference on South Carolina will be held March 1-2 at USC-Aiken, through the University of South Carolina's Systemwide Council on Regional Studies. The conference will have scholars from a variety of disciplines to focus on South Carolina in general and the Aiken area in particular.

COASTAL EDUCATIONAL CONSORTIUM

The Coastal Educational Consortium is offering a half-day study of "Time On Task," an introduction to current research on the relationship between student time spent on a learning task and academic achievement. The program is co-sponsored with the South Carolina Administrators' Leadership Academy. It will be held from 1-3:30 p.m., Wednesday, Feb. 20 in room 205 of the Student Center. Dennis Wiseman is in charge of the college's participation. The Coastal Education Consortium is comprised of the school districts of Horry, Georgetown, and Williamsburg counties, Coastal Carolina College and Horry-Georgetown Technical College.

SABBATICAL LEAVES

Carolyn Cox, Donald Millus and Elizabeth Puskar will each be on leave during some part of the 1985-86 academic year.

Cox will pursue advanced study in choral conducting during the Spring 1985 semester. Millus will complete a book on fishing during the Fall 1985 semester. Puskar will develop a proposal for integrating women's studies into the curriculum. Applications for sabbatical leave were received and approved by the Faculty Welfare and Development Committee who then forwarded its recommendations to Elinor Miller. Following the chancellor's approval, the applications were sent to Provost Borkowski, at USC-Columbia for approval.
