In-state tuition will increase \$50 per semester, from \$3,750 to \$3,800 per semester, an increase of 1.33 percent. Out-of-state tuition will increase \$200 per semester, from \$8,095 to \$8,295, an increase of 2.5 percent.

Carol Osborne, associate professor of education, was one of 20 educators in the country selected to study Japan during a three-week workshop held in Honolulu. The Japan Studies Association, with a grant from the Freeman Foundation, conducted the session for faculty and administrators from two- and four-year colleges and universities. The workshop was for educators with little or no prior academic background on Japan who wish to begin incorporating Japan studies into their courses. Osborne said daily lectures and hands-on learning included language, history, politics, economics and culture. "I hope to create a course on the Japanese education system, what it's like to be educated there as compared to what it's like here," said Osborne. "There are many similarities as well as differences. It was an energizing experience."

Gov. Mark Sanford recently presented Coastal physics professor **Var Limpasuvan** with the Governor's Young Scientist Award for Excellence in Scientific Research.
