Coastal Carolina College will have summer performances that will run repertory style from July 11 -August 3 in Wheelwright Performing Arts Center. The two plays to be performed are Harvey, by Mary Chase, and Dial 'M' for Murder by Frederick Knott. David E. Majewski, chairman of the Department of Theatre and Speech, will direct both productions. This is the first time a summer repertory theatre has been tried at Coastal Carolina College. Auditions for both plays will be held May 20, 21 and 22 from 6:30 - 8:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Performing Arts Center. ### MATHEMATICS PROFESSOR GETS SYSTEM—WIDE AWARD FOR FOUR-YEAR CAMPUSES

Subhash Saxena of the School of Mathematics and Computer Science was named USC-Educational Foundation Distinguished Teacher of the Year for Four-Year Campuses in the University of South Carolina System. This is the second consecutive year a Coastal Carolina College faculty member has received the honor. Last year's "Distinguished Teacher of the Year for Four-Year Campuses" was Claudia Cleary of the School of Humanities, Dr. Saxena went before a 16-member panel in Columbia and gave a presentation followed by a 15-minute question and answer session. Competing for the award with Dr. Saxena were faculty members from USC-Spartanburg and USC-Aiken. "I didn't really think I would win because we won last year," said Dr. Saxena. "I was surprised and told my son, Anil, (a high school student who won Coastal's recent Level II Individual Mathematics Competition) that he wasn't the only one in the family to get awards." Dr. Saxena went to the Columbia competition after being named Coastal's Teacher of the Year.

# BLENDING HUMANITIES WITH MATH IS PRESENTATION SCHEDULED FOR APRIL 25

"Putting The Heart Before the Course" will be the topic of an April 25 presentation by Herbert Gross, a professor at Bunker Hill-Community College in Boston, Mass. The topic is on blending the humanities with mathematics. Herb Gross is a leading mathematics educator and founding president of A.M.A.T.Y.C. The professor was chosen by M.I.T. to video-record its calculus course sequence, and he is the author of mathematics texts. All mathematics teachers in the community and students are invited to attend the lecture, which will be at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 25 in the Little Theatre in the Fine Arts Building. The visit is being sponsored by the School of Mathematics and Computer Science.
