first served basis, and appointments are not required. They'll be given in the Human Resources Conference Room at Atheneum Hall. The cost of the shot is \$15, payable to Conway Medical Center.

Psi Chi helps Tara Hall Home for boys

Beginning today and continuing through Nov. 12, Psi Chi, the national honor society in psychology, is accepting donations for Tara Hall Home for Boys. Tara Home for Boys, located in Georgetown, serves as a long-term residential school that develops moral, social, educational and life skills for neglected, troubled and abused boys. As a private institution this organization does not get government funding and relies solely on individual contributions to meet operating costs.

Tara Hall Home for Boys accepts an extremely wide range of donations, such as: school supplies (book bags, paper, pencils, spiral notebooks), boys clothing, especially children's size 5 and over, solid colored t-shirts of all sizes, computer supplies (diskettes, writable CDs, paper, ink cartridges,) paper products (toilet tissue, paper towels), bath items (soap, shampoo, conditioner, deodorant, hair brushes/combs), towels, bedding, yard items, kitchen items (dish cloths, mops, brooms), cleaning supplies, travel bags and new bathing suits. A donation box is located in the Office of Student Activities in the Student Center and in the faculty hall of the Coastal Science Center.
