TUITION RATES INCREASE

The Board of Trustees of the University of South Carolina recently announced tuition increases for all campuses in the USC System. Tuition at USC Coastal Carolina College for in-state, full-time students will be \$600 per semester; and \$1,270 for out-of-state, full-time students. Costs for part-time students will be \$50 per credit hour for South Carolina residents; and \$100 per credit hour for out-of-state students. Chancellor Ronald G. Eaglin said the college has made a firm decision not to add the "hidden costs," such as surcharges per credit hour, that have been adopted by other System campuses. These hidden costs, he said, can represent as much as \$80 per semester for some students and are not anticipated by college students and their families when planning personal budgets.

PROFESSIONAL BASEBALL COMES TO COASTAL CAROLINA

Coastal Carolina Stadium will host the regularly scheduled season baseball match-up between the Sumter Braves and the Florence Blue Jays at 5 p.m. Aug. 9. The game is sponsored by the Myrtle Beach Jaycees with proceeds going to the United Way of Horry County. General admission will be \$5. Tickets are on sale at three Banker's Trust locations, The Sun News, WKZQ-Radio, or through the Braves and Blue Jays ticket offices. Both teams honor season passes. Florence and Sumter have met on six different occasions this season with each team taking home three victories. The Braves took first place in their division for the

first half of the year, while the Blue Jays are top of their division during the South Atlantic League's second half of its season.

COMPUTER SERVICES DIVISION ACQUIRES EPISTAT PROGRAMS

Coastal Carolina's Computer Services Division has acquired EPISTAT, a collection of programs in BASICA for statistical analysis of small- and medium-sized data samples. EPISTAT's 25 programs perform more than 40 statistical tests or functions and provide utilities for data entry, editing, printing, graphics, sorting, selecting, transforming and crosstabs. The programs are intended to be self-explanatory and simple to use. EPISTAT is another package in the Computer Services Division's growing library of "shareware/freeware" software, that may be copied and distributed with minimal restrictions and at no cost to the user.
