## THE CHANCELLOR'S REPORT

Chancellor Eaglin met with area press last week to outline Coastal's short-range goals and to explain how Coastal fits into Dr. Holderman's University System plan for 2001. Dr. Eaglin's goals are summarized below:

- To improve student retention
- To seek a change in the Commission on Higher Education's definition of resident housing by 1987.
- To enroll 4,000 students (FTE count)
- To construct a new \$5.5 million, 52,000 sq. ft. business administration building
- To have housing for 426 students completed, and housing for another 500 under construction
- To have approval for a general classroom building
- To have 200 full-time faculty on campus
- To have ETV operating a studio from Coastal's campus
- To purse BSN nursing accreditation and AACSB accreditation in business administration
- To have an athletic program affiliated with NCAA in Division I
- To have a Coastal Scholars program to attract the top 10 high school scholars from the local area
- To have an effective and fully integrated general education program for all students
- To have paid for all college land in the master plan
- To develop a growing endowment
- To develop at least six new academic programs selected by the faculty and closely tied to the tourism industry

 Professor Stewart W. Strothers, Assistant Professor of Education and Director of Minority Student Relations, attended a six week College Management Program at Carnegie-Mellon University, Pittsburg, PA. Topics covered during this intense six-week program were: Marketing, Budgeting, Leadership Development, Administration and Management in Higher Education, Finance, Recruitment and Retention, Human Relations, and Computer Technology.

The 30 participants represented colleges and universities from 19 states and Puerto Rico. Participants included two from the State of South Carolina (both from the University of South Carolina system) and included two and four-year college presidents and administrators. This intense program was conducted over 6-day work weeks including July 4 over the period June 16 through July 12, 1985.

This College Management Program is in its ace year and Carnegie-Mellon officials characterized it as the "most outstanding" in the eighth year history of the higher education management institute.
