ART PROFESSOR WINS INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION

Zdzislaw Sikora, associate professor of art, was awarded America's largest prize in Printmaking, the \$5,000 Best of Show award at the Ybor City International Print Competition. The winning print was of Sikora's 1984 colour etching, "Adam and Eve Witness The Temptations of St. Anthony," a 35 1/2-inch x 47 1/2-inch diptych. Juror for the exhibition was Mauricio Lazansky, professor emeritus at the University of Iowa. The exhibition opened Sept. 20 and runs through Oct. 3 at both the Ybor Art Colony and the Ars Universalis gallery in Ybor City (Tampa,) Fla.
