

ENROLLMENT JUMPS 11.1 PERCENT

Fall enrollment at USC Coastal Carolina jumped to 11.1 percent this fall, bringing the total number of undergraduate students at the college to 2,923.

Enrollment at the college last fall was 2,631, according to statistics from the Registrar's Office.

The nine-campus USC System grew 2.6 percent over fall 1984, with 34,882 students compared to 34,004 in 1984.

Coastal Carolina credited its enrollment increase to the college's new academic programs and an expanded faculty; more emphasis on student recruitment; more visibility of the college in the region and the state; and the growing population in the area.

FACULTY GRANT DEADLINE NEARS

The deadline to apply for fall faculty development grants is Oct. 4. Application materials may be obtained from deans or from Charmaine Tomczyk, chairperson of the Faculty Welfare Development Committee, at ext. 2403. Previous grant recipients are reminded that a written report covering progress or completion of their earlier funded projects must be submitted before new applications can be considered by the committee.

CAREER PLANNING/COUNSELING

Position searches are underway to fill position vacancies for Director of Career Planning and Placement and Director of Counseling.

Effective immediately, the counseling and career planning office hours are suspended until the position searches are completed. The Placement Service (job listings, job interviews and resume information) will continue. Stewart Strothers, Director of Minority Student Relations, will handle all disabled student matters. All services are expected to reopen Nov. 1.

Alisa Mosley, who was Coastal Carolina's Director of Career Planning and Placement, accepted a similar position at USC-Columbia. Cynthia Terres, who was Director of Counseling, accepted the position of Director of Pupil Services for the Anchorage, Alaska school system.

Ms. Mosley was selected as Outstanding New Professional for 1984 by the South Carolina College Personnel Association. Dr. Terres was selected the South Carolina Post Secondary Counselor of the Year in 1985 by the South Carolina School Counselors Association.
