## INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS CELEBRATES OFFICIAL OPENING

The Office of International Programs at Coastal Carolina will celebrate its official opening Wednesday, Oct. 16 with an open house from 2-4 p.m. The office serves as a center of information for study and travel abroad, as well as a meeting place for students and faculty with international interests.

The office operates under a grant provided by the U.S. Department of Education, under its Undergraduate International Studies and Foreign Languages Program.

With overall funding amounting to almost a quarter million dollars over two years, the grant also provides funds for a native speaker tutorial program and lab assistance in foreign languages, and a faculty position in international studies.

The eighth Classroom 85 Conference for educators Oct. 18-19 will focus on "Becoming Assertive In Classroom Management."

AUTHOR HARRAGAN TO SPEAK  
AT WOMEN IN MANAGEMENT  
CONFERENCE

Betty Lehan Harragan, author of Games Mother Never Taught You, and a columnist with Mademoiselle and Working Woman magazines, will be the keynote speaker at the Women In Management seminar Nov. 7-8 at the Quality Royale Beach Cove Inn in North Myrtle Beach.

Harragan's book is considered the "working woman's bible." Her latest publication is Knowing The Score: Play-by-Play Directions for Women on the Job.

The two-day conference will have sessions on understanding your subordinates, dealing with behaviors of difficult people, learning the politics to break into the male power structure, interpreting financial statements and reports, knowing about health issues affecting women and productivity, and learning about legal issues affecting managers.

## FACULTY/STAFF NEWS

DR. HERB WEIGAND'S watercolor painting "Passage," was awarded honorable mention at the Springs Art Show in Lancaster. The award carries with it a cash prize and inclusion in the 1985-86 Springs Traveling Art Show. The traveling show will be on continuous exhibition throughout the country until July 1986.

ZDZISLAW SIKORA is one of 20 American printmakers selected to exhibit three prints each in the Ninth University of Dallas National Print Invitational. The group was picked by a selection committee that sought artists with extensive exhibition records. The exhibition will be at the University of Dallas and then go on a two-year tour of Texas institutions and museums.

DR. BALLOU SKINNER, professor of physics, will present a seminar at 2:15 p.m. Monday, Oct. 21 in room 120 of the Science Building. The topic will be "Star Wars: the Neutral Particle Beam" based on research conducted by Dr. Skinner for the U.S. Air Force at Arnold Engineering Development Center, Tullahoma, Tenn., during Summer 1985.

DR. WALTER STANALAND of the School of Mathematics and Computer Science will present a paper entitled "Polarization in Dielectric Liquids" at the annual Conference on Phenomena in Amherst, N.Y. Oct. 22. The conference is an international retreat for people involved in insulation research, and is sponsored by the IEEE.

Stanaland's paper will be formally presented, and a poster-board display of the contents of the paper must be defended throughout the four-day conference. This is the fifth paper authored by Stanaland on the subject of drift dominated conduction theory. He and Dr. M. Zahn of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology defined the theory which describes conduction by charged impurity particle motion in dielectric liquids when alternating voltages are applied. Stanaland developed and extended the theory to include identification of impurity particle physical characteristics from external circuit measurement. This requires the simultaneous solution of over 400 nonlinear partial differential solutions in the continuum between electrodes. This paper relates orientational polarization of impurity particles to external current flow characteristics.

These research activities are expected to be useful in multi-megavolt power transmission line development, better transformer design and short-term life testing of insulation materials.
