BRITISH DIGNITARY TO SPEAK ON TERRORISM

The Right Honorable James Prior, until recently the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland, will speak at USC Coastal Carolina College at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 20 in Wheelright Performing Arts Center.

James Prior is a member of the British Parliament and has been Queen Elizabeth's consultant on the problems of Northern Ireland and terrorism.

Because of Prior's former position with the British government, there will be security officers with him on his visit to the campus. The public, faculty, staff and students are invited to hear James Prior speak. Everyone also is asked to remember that these extra precautions are necessary and it is best not to carry briefcases or large purses with you to the lecture.

COASTAL CAROLINA STUDENT ELECTED AS GOVERNOR OF S.C. STUDENT LEGISLATURE

Steven Neeves, a Coastal Carolina College government and philosophy student, was elected 1985-86 Governor of the S.C. Student Legislature.

According to Robert W. Squatriglia, associate chancellor for Student Development, this is the first time in the college's 31-year history that a student has been elected to that position. Neeves, who was President Pro-Tem of the

S.C. Student Legislature last year, is the son of William and Roberta Neeves of Myrtle Beach. He and his wife live on Burcale Road in Myrtle Beach.

Bills passed during the Student Legislature sessions will go to the S.C. General Assembly. Neeves said several laws, such as the turn-right-on-red law, originally had been a Student Legislature bill that was sent to the General Assembly.

Coastal Impoundments, or former rice fields, are of interest as natural resources of the coastal zone. Dr. Joe Kelly will address the ecological character and significances of these areas and offer some speculation on their future use.

BHOPAL GAS LEAK IS SUBJECT OF RESEARCHER'S COASTAL CAROLINA VISIT

It was nearly a year ago when the biggest industrial accident in history killed nearly 3,000 people.

Dr. M.P. Singh, the head of the National Centre for Atmospheric and Fluid Sciences at the Indian Institute of Technology at New Delhi, will be at Coastal Carolina Nov. 25 to speak on "Dispersion of MIC in Bhopal Gas Leak Episode-- Output from Mathematical Model." The presentation will be in room 120 of the Science Building.

Dr. Singh has received cooperation and collaboration from various U.S. scientists and also was awarded an NSF Grant. His visit is sponsored by the School of Mathematics and and Computer Science, the School of Science, and the USC-Educational Foundation. Dr. Singh will make a presentation at USC-Columbia on Nov. 26.
