This is an ancient service revised several years ago by Kings College, Cambridge, England.

The USC Coastal Carolina Concert Choir will lead the music.

YOU HAVE A CHANCE TO SEE THE COMET TUESDAY NIGHT

Anyone who wants to see Halley's Comet can give it a try at USC Coastal Carolina College from 7-9 p.m. Tuesday on the roof of the Science Building.

Dr. Walter Van Hamme of the college's faculty will tell viewers about the orbit of the comet and where to locate it in the sky. Coastal's portable telescope will be available, as well as binoculars (7x35 or 7x50). The Grand Strand Astronomy Club will assist viewers. In case of cloudy weather, Dec. 11 is an alternate date. Viewers also can watch for the comet at a second session on Jan. 8. The dates were chosen for best possible viewing.
