ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE AWARD NOMINATIONS

The Student Affairs Committee will be sending a letter to all eligible students, inviting their self-nomination for consideration for the college's Academic Excellence Award, formerly known as the Faculty General Excellence Award. This award will be presented at the annual Honors Convocation April 29. Students eligible for this award must satisfy the following criteria:

-be a graduating senior

-have accumulated a 3.5 GPR or above

-have submitted the completed and signed nomination form for the Academic Excellence Award

In addition, that form must be signed by a faculty member who can certify the academic excellence as reflected by a "discipline-related activity." Criteria for this award are:

-scholarship (3.5 GPR or above)
-academic excellence as can be certified by a faculty member -academic achievement as reflected in honors and awards received

Students who fulfill the criteria and who do not receive a letter from the Student Affairs Committee should contact the Office of the Dean of Student Development, Student Center 206 D, for an application. The application deadline is 5 p.m., Monday, March 17. Students or community members having questions regarding this award should contact the Office of the Dean of Student Development, ext. 2300.

GEORGE C. ROGERS AWARD NOMINATIONS

The Student Affairs Committee invites nominations for the college's annual George C. Rogers Award which will be presented at the annual honors Convocation, April 29. Students eligible for this award must meet the following criteria:

-have senior status and good

academic standing

-have distinguished themselves in conspicuous service to the campus

-have been involved significantly in campus organizations, groups, and activities

-have played a leadership role
in one or more campus
organization or service

-have contributed significantly to the quality of campus life

Faculty, staff, and students are invited to nominate individuals by sending a nomination form, signed by both the candidate and nominator, to the Student Affairs Committee. Student Center, room 206, not later than 5 p.m. Monday, March 17. The Student Affairs Committee will examine and consider all candidates. develop a campus ballot, and administer a campus-wide vote for the recipient of this prestigious award. MENC FORMED CHAPTER AT COASTAL

Last semester, with the help of faculty advisor Lelia Smalley, a group of students formed a chapter of the Music Educators National Conference (MENC) here at Coastal. On February 14 and 15, at the state convention of MENC in Greenville, the Coastal delegation (8 students and 1 advisor) represented the largest student chapter present. In addition Coastal's Pam Muise collected an overwhelming majority of the vote to capture the post of State Student Division Vice President for the 1986-87 term. MENC supports the advancement and importance of music and education across the nation and sposoring workshops, seminars, concerts, and much more.
