TOPICS OF TERRORISM, BRITISH POLITICS TO BE DISCUSSED BY TWO DISTINGUISHED SPEAKERS MARCH 19-21

Two distinguished visitors. Ambassador Parker W. Borg and The Right Honourable William Rodgers, will speak on campus next week. Mr. Rodgers is one of the celebrated "Gang of Four," a group of senior political leaders who broke away from the British Labour Party in 1981 to found a new political party. This new Social Democratic Party, of which Mr. Rodgers is vice-president, survived its baptism of fire in the 1983 elections, running in tandum with Britain's Liberal Party and winning nearly one-quarter of all votes cast. A member of Parliament for 21 years, Mr. Rodgers has served as a cabinet minister in several British governments and holds an honors degree from Oxford University.

Mr. Rodgers will conduct an informal colloguium in the Academic Building Wednesday, March 19, 7 p.m. The colloquium will provide an opportunity for questions and discussions. Faculty, staff, students, and interested members of the community are invited to attend. On Thursday, March 20, at 10 a.m., Mr. Rodgers will deliver a lecture in Wheelwright Auditorium. describing the current state of politics in Mrs. Thatcher's Britain with particular reference to the role played by the Social Democratic Party. This lecture is also open to the public.

Ambassador Parker W. Borg is one of the US Government's top specialists in the field of terrorism and counter-terrorism. Beginning his career as a Peace Corps volunteer in the Philippines, he advanced quickly through the ranks of the State Department, working in Malaya, Vietnam, Zaire, and Mali as well as Washington. In 1984, he returned from Mali, where he had served as ambassador, to become deputy director in the Office for Counterterrorism and Emergency Planning (now called the Office of the Ambassador-at-large for Counterterrorism).

Ambassador Borg will appear in Wheelwright Auditorium Friday, March 21, 11:30 a.m. for a lecture on the American reaction to terrorism in the modern world. Faculty, staff, students, and the public are invited to attend. Friday evening, the International Relations Council of the Carolinas will host a dinner in honor of Ambassador Borg.
