THE FOLLOWING STATEMENT WAS ISSUED BY CHANCELLOR EAGLIN DURING A NEWS CONFERENCE HELD ON CAMPUS WEDNESDAY, APRIL 9.

As Chancellor of Coastal Carolina College, I regret to announce that Bobby Richardson has resigned as head baseball coach to accept a position with Liberty University in Lynchburg, Virginia. Bobby and I have had discussions as late as 7:30 this morning concerning the college's wish for him to continue as head baseball coach. Coach Richardson has indicated that he will continue his duties at Coastal and remain with his team through the end of the current baseball season.

Coastal Carolina College has been extremely fortunate to have Bobby as head baseball coach for the past two years. He has brought a degree of professionalism to our baseball program which will help us as we develop in the NCAA. We are grateful to him for the contributions he has made to the college and to our sports program.

We fully understand Bobby's desire to move into this new position. In short, Liberty University made an offer he could not refuse. It will be difficult to replace Bobby. He has developed such a close rapport with his team, with the college, and with the community. His commitment to his players and the program is shared by me, and we will make every effort to ensure that baseball will be a premier sport at Coastal Carolina College.

It is with regret that we accept his resignation. Bobby, on behalf of the college community, I'd like to take this opportunity to congratulate you on your appointment and wish you success.

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# DICK CAVETT COMING TO COASTAL APRIL 22

Television personality Dick Cavett will lecture at Coastal Tuesday, April 22, 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium as part of the William A. Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series.

Cavett has interviewed an international who's who of the arts, letters, and politics — from Noel Coward to Lester Maddox, from Mary McCarthy to Hugh Hefner, from Jane Fonda to Gerald Ford. He tackled themes such as Watergate, alcoholism, pornography, and youth gangs.

Prior to his lecture, members of the audience will be asked to submit questions which Mr. Cavett may address during the program. If you plan to attend and would like to submit a question beforehand, please type or print it on a 3 x 5 card and send it to Margaret Ammons or Cathy McPherson in the College Advancement Office.

The lecture is free an open to the public, however seats will be available on a first-come, first-served basis the night of the performance. The auditorium will open at 7:30 p.m.

# COASTAL RECEIVES GRANT FOR MATH, SCIENCE TEACHING PROJECT

Coastal has received a grant from the Commission of Higher Education to fund a summer institute for developing and reinforcing the teaching of problem-solving skills in the curriculum of high school math and science teachers.

Approximately 20 Horry County

teachers will participate in a one-week workshop "Teaching to Develop Reasoning and Problem-Solving Skills." It will be conducted by Dr. Mark Smith of Cazenovia College, Cazenovia, New York, who is working on a similar project for the State University of New York. The workshop will be followed by a five-week practicum using ninth and tenth grade students as teaching subjects. Teachers may earn six graduate credits through the program.

The institute is funded by a grant authorized under Title II of the federal Education for Economic Security Act of 1984 and awarded through the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education. For additional information, contact project director Dr. Richard Koesterer, ext. 2087.

# SUMMER ISEP EXCHANGE PROGRAMS OFFERED

Through the ISEP exchange program, French Language Studies will be available at the Universite de Savoie in two sessions: June 28 to July 25, and August 2 to August 29. The price has not been determined, but it is likely to be \$1200 for tuition, room and board for one session, or \$1800 for both.

ISEP also offers Arabic (any level, including beginners) in a special intensive program by the Bourgiba Institute of Modern Languages of the University of Tunis from July 6 to August 15. The price will probably range from \$1200 to \$1600 depending on the number of participants.

Thailand, offers a summer program
through ISEP from June 28 to July
28. It involves lectures and
excursions in English by Thai
professors on subjects in the areas
of history, religion, sociology,
anthropology, literature, political
science, and economics

# FACULTY, STAFF, STUDENT NEWS

o DR. BETH HAYNES, assistant professor of economics, presented a paper, "The Economics Major in the Labor Force: An Evaluation of Economic Education," recently at the Midsouth Academy of Economics and Finance in Memphis. Elaine D. Scott, VPI&SU, was co-author. While at the convention. Dr. Havnes attended the meeting of the Board of Editors of the Midsouth Journal of Economics and Finance on which she serves. She has completed a report (with Scott and Esther Maddux, University of Georgia) "Farm Household Financial Management in South Carolina, Vermont, and Georgia," for the SC Department of Agriculture. She will attend the Eastern Economics Association annual convention in Philadelphia April 10-12 to chair a session on economic education.

o ZDZISLAW SIKORA, associate professor of art, will speak to the Associated Artists of Winston-Salem in their Spring Lunch 'N Arts series April 15. He will discuss the development of his work over the last ten years. Four artists are selected for this program which "features artists outside of North Carolina who are making immorative contributions to visual fine arts." Funding for these programs comes from the Grassroots Program of the NC Arts Council and Arts Council, Inc.

Sikora also accepted and invitation from Professor Boyd Saunders of the

Art Department at USC Columbia to present a series of lectures and demonstrations of color etching methods April 9.

His intaglio print "Memento Mori" which is currently part of the "Point of Departure" portfolio is being shown at the Atlanta College of Art. The portfolio will continue its tour at the following sites: Coastal Carolina College, April; Cultural Center of the Chicago Office of Fine Arts, May and June; Westfield State College, Westfield Massachusetts, August; and The University of Massachusetts, September.

At the conclusion of the tour, the entire portfolio will enter the permanent collection of the Eluhejem Museum of Art at the University of Wisconsin.

- o DR. LES WHITLEY, associate professor of biology, attended a public health conference and technical session at the UNC Chapel Hill March 19-20. The overall theme of the conference was Planning a Healthy Environment: A Cooperative Effort. The theme of the technical session was Risk Assessment and Toxic Materials.
- o DR. WALTER STANALAND, associate professor of mathematics and computer science, was a guest at Exxon Engineering and Systems Science Laboratory in Clinton, New Jersey April 7, where he gave a presentation on Drift Dominated Conduction Theory and discussed the possibilities of establishing engineering research relationships with the laboratory. The theory discussed was initially defined by Dr. Stanaland and Dr. M Zahn (MIT) in the mid 1970's. It was developed and extended by Dr. Stanaland so that it provides an analytic model for investigating the nature of internal conduction processes of materials by external observation of electric signal characteristics when high voltages are applied.

o DR. JOSEPH E CICERO, dean of the School of Mathematics and Computer Science, served as chairman of the Distinguished Teacher Selection Committee for four-year campuses in the university system on April 4.

BRUCE BACON, president of SGA, was the student representative from Coastal on the Distinguished Teacher Selection Committee.

- o DR. SUSAN WEBB, assistant professor of sociology, presented a paper, "Investigating Presidential Mobility with Discriminant Function Analysis," at the 50th annual meeting of the Southern Sociological Society in New Orleans April 9-12. Dr. Webb is the SC representative on the society's membership committee.
- o Dr. Herb Weigand, assistant professor of art, attended the annual conference of the National Art Education Association in New Orleans April 4-8 where he presented his paper, "From Modern Science Into Modern Art." The paper discusses the influence that scientific discoveries of the 19th and 20th centuries had on the development of modern painting of that period.
