William Waccamaw River volunteers to convene

The 3rd Annual Conference of the Waccamaw River Volunteer Monitoring Project is scheduled for Wednesday, Sept. 24 beginning at noon at the Waccamaw Higher Education Center in Litchfield. The event will include presentations by the Waccamaw Watershed Academy of Coastal Carolina University, the S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control (SC DHEC), the United States Geological Survey (USGS) and the stormwater managers from Conway, Georgetown County and Horry County. The conference will recognize the important

role that citizen science plays in environmental management and protection of the traditional beneficial uses of the Waccamaw River watershed.

"My Voice My Vote," a campus election rally sponsored by the Delta Sigma Theta sorority, is scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 30 from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on the Prince Lawn.
