DICK CAVETT COMING TO COASTAL APRIL 22

Television personality Dick Cavett will lecture at Coastal Tuesday, April 22, 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium as part of the William A. Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series.

Cavett has interviewed an international who's who of the arts, letters, and politics — from Noel Coward to Lester Maddox, from Mary McCarthy to Hugh Hefner, from Jane Fonda to Gerald Ford. He tackled themes such as Watergate, alcoholism, pornography, and youth gangs.

Prior to his lecture, members of the audience will be asked to submit questions which Mr. Cavett may address during the program. If you plan to attend and would like to submit a question beforehand, please type or print it on a 3 x 5 card and send it to Margaret Ammons or Cathy McPherson in the College Advancement Office.

The lecture is free and open to the public, however seats will be available on a first-come, first-served basis the night of the performance. The auditorium will open at 7:30 p.m.

The Kimbel Lecture Series is sponsored by the Kimbel Trust, the Episcopal Diocese of South Carolina, the Sun Publishing Company, the Coastal Educational Foundation, the Horry County Higher Education Commission, and USC Coastal Carolina College.

JOHN VROOMAN NAMED HEAD BASEBALL COACH

John F. Vrooman has been named fulltime baseball coach and associate athletic director at Coastal effective July 1, 1986, Chancellor Eaglin has announced.

"My decision to appoint John is based on several factors," Dr. Eaglin said. "First and foremost is his sound background in baseball and his excellent record as head baseball coach for Coastal during the mid 1970's when we were building our program. We are looking to his experience, leadership, and loyalty to our program as guiding forces when we move to NCAA Division I next season. He will be as asset to Coastal in his new position; he knows the players, he knows the college, and he knows baseball."

Vrooman decided to make the move back to coaching, he said, "because of the love I have for the sport both as a player and as a coach. I am anxious to accept the challenge of leading the team as we become an NCAA Division I college." He said that he was pleased to see what he termed as "changes taking place in the players' attitude toward academics and sports" and that he wants to continue emphasizing the importance of academics in his program. He also plans to maintain a close relationship with his colleagues in the academic area.

JAPANESE NOH PLAY TO BE PRESENTED ON CAMPUS APRIL 27

The Office of International Programs will present Master Makio Umewaka and his assistants in a classic Japanese drama in the Noh tradition Sunday, April 27, 2:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Japanese drama, specifically the Noh style, will be introduced to the audience by Professor Tadashi Mikami, a student of Master Umewaka and a Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence at Coker College, Hartsville, South Carolina.

Noh is a composite form of theatre involving poetic and symbolic situations often drawn from classical literature. Its performance combines vocal chants, instrumental music, acting techniques, dance elements and aspects of fine arts, crafts and architecture. The costumes, masks and theatres themselves are works of art and are sometimes regarded as national treasures.

The Coastal presentation will be a classic entitled "Tale of Genji." It is a story about the jealousy between Genji's wife and mistress and the resulting conflict between good and evil.

o ALINE RODRIGUES, a senior marine science major, has been selected to participate in the summer student program at the Horn Point Environmental Laboratories which is a branch of the University of Maryland. The program is designed to offer outstanding students the opportunity to develop their potential as research scientists through intensive study of the Chesapeake Bay ecosystems.
