## FACULTY, STUDENTS TAKE AWARDS IN JURIED ART SHOW

The works of two faculty members and several Coastal students have received awards in the 17th annual Juried Art Show sponsored by the Waccamaw Arts and Crafts Guild. Dr. Herbert Weigand, assistant professor of art, received the first place purchase award for his 42" x 56" oil on linen diptych which will become part of the guild's permanent collection and will be put on exhibit at the Myrtle Beach Convention Center when the show closes.

Zdzislaw Sikora, associate professor of art, received two awards. "Conflicts #1," a 23 1/2" x 47" diptych color intaglio, was given second place overall, and "Memento Mori II," a 15" x 20" color intaglio, was awarded a purchase prize and enters the collection of Women's Medical Center, Conway.

o JACQUELINE L. Earlier this month, she presented a paper, "The Pulse of Wonder and Fear in the World of Chriss Van Allsbury," at East Carolina University's tenth annual children's literature conference.

o DR. RICHARD H. MOORE, dean of the School of Sciences, attended the Association of Southeastern Biologists 49th annual meeting in Columbia April 10-11. Dr. Moore attended paper sessions and business meetings organized by the Southeastern Chapter of the

Ecological Society of America, the Southeastern Division of the American Society of Ichthyologists and Herpetologists and the Southeastern Fishes Council. At the meeting, Dr. Moore also had the opportunity to see Coastal alumnus Mark Peterson (Marine Science) who is currently completing his Ph.D. at the University of Southern Mississippi. Mark's dissertation involves a study of the ecology and physiology of freshwater fishes inhabiting low salinity brackish water marshes along the Gulf Coast.

BALLOU SKINNER, professor of physics, presented a paper entitled "The Determination of Uranium in Trace Amounts via Fission Track Measurements" at the annual South Carolina Academy of Science meeting April 17 at Clemson University. Dr. Skinner also spoke to Surfside Kiwanis Club on April 14 on the topic of the "Neutral Particle Beam as it Relates to the Strategic Defense Initiative."

o STEVE NAGEL, assistant professor of English, chaired a session on theoretical grammar at SECOL XXXIV, the spring conference of the Southeastern Conference on Linguistics.
