CHE APPROVES COASTAL'S PLAN FOR RESIDENCE HALLS

Conway, SC - USC Coastal Carolina College received approval Thursday from the state Commission on Higher Education (CHE) to build a residence hall complex on its campus in Conway.

CHE approval was the final step in the process which required changing Coastal's mission statement in the State Master Plan for Higher Education to permit residence halls on campus. CHE will now recommend the plan to the Joint Bond Review Committee and the State Budget and Control Board. Their decision is expected by mid May.

Coastal Chancellor Ron Eaglin, who made on-campus housing one of the top priorities in his long-range plan, said the decision "marks the beginning of a new era for Coastal Carolina College, an era in which we will experience increased growth and development. We are located in the heart of the 13th fastest growing county in the nation, and Coastal is growing at a similar pace. Last year, we experienced a 10% increase in enrollment, and by the year 2000,

it has been estimated that more than 5000 students will be attending Coastal. There is an existing student demand to fill these residence halls, and this demand will increase as more and more students opt for on-campus housing."

"Residence halls will enable us to better serve our student population by providing an atmosphere conducive to college life," Eaglin said. "They will establish a nucleus for campus-oriented programs that will give

students an opportunity to make the most of their college experience. This will not alter our primary mission of serving the residents of the Waccamaw region; it will simply provide an option for students who choose not to commute and who want to reside in a safe and wholesome environment."

Eaglin said that pending the final approvals in May, the college will be able to move ahead with the project and meet the completion deadline of August 1, 1987. The complex, which includes six three-floor, apartment-style residence halls, will be built at no cost to taxpayers. Construction will be financed by a \$5 million revenue bond which will be repaid with housing fees generated at the college. The complex will house approximately 426 students and will be supervised by a resident manager and six resident assistants.

FIFTH ANNUAL HONORS CONVOCATION HELD

Coastal students who have excelled in academics, campus activities, and athletics were recognized during the fifth annual honors convocation held Tuesday evening in Wheelwright Auditorium.

The college's most prestigious award, the Academic Excellence Award, went to Nicola C. Vlassis. A graduating senior and psychology major, Vlassis has maintained a 4.0 GPR. She is currently pursuing several research projects which involve the basic principles of biofeedback and relaxation training.

In addition to her academic achievements, she is a member of ODK, the Psychology Club, and the History Club.

The George C. Rodgers Award, presented annually to the student who has excelled in campus service, went to Nancy Cicero of Conway. She will graduate in May with a degree in mathematics. As a student at Coastal, Cicero has been involved in more than 13 organizations. She is treasurer of the Student Government Association, president of the Math Club, a member of the Student Affairs Committee, Campus Union, Allocations Committee, Intercollegiate Athletic Committee, and ODK. She has been involved in a number of college events including Open House, the Coastal Math Competition, and Orientation. In addition, she served on the Search Committee for Athletic Director and was a Senior Day guide. She is the daughter of Dr. Joseph Cicero, dean of mathematics and computer science.
