RESIDENCE HALLS MOVE STEP CLOSER TO FINAL APPROVAL

The Joint Bond Review Committee of the General Assmebly approved last Wednesday \$5 million in revenue bonds for the construction of residence halls at Coastal and recommended that the plan be sent to the state Budget and Control Board for final approval.

The motion to approve the plan was made by Senator James M. Waddell, Jr. and seconded by Georgetown Senator William W. Doar, Jr. It passed 5 to 1.

Chancellor Eaglin said that pending approval of the Budget and Control Board, selection of an architect would be made in early June. The general contractor would be named in mid-July and ground would be broken in late August or early September. This timetable would enable the college to meet the fall 1987 completion date.

CHICORA ROTARY ESTABLISHES SCHOLARSHIPS

Chicora Rotary of Myrtle Beach has established two scholarships for USC Coastal Carolina students.

According to Rotary President Tommy Camp, the organization has made an initial pledge of \$25,000 to support two annual scholarship awards, one to an undergraduate student and one to an Horry County teacher enrolled in the graduate school. The amount of each award will be determined on a case-by-case basis by the scholarship committee of the Coastal Educational Foundation. Rotary members hope the scholarships will encourage and promote academic excellence among the young people of the Grand Strand and the teachers of Horry County. Undergraduate applicants must be residents of the coastal area extending from Brookgreen Gardens to North Carolina and inland to the Intracoastal Waterway. Graduate applicants must have taught in an Horry County school for one year and have intentions of remaining as a teacher in Horry County for an additional year.
