

RESIDENCE HALL PLAN RECEIVES GO-AHEAD FROM BUDGET AND CONTROL BOARD

The plan to build residence halls on campus was approved unanimously by the State Budget and Control Board last Wednesday.

Chancellor Eaglin said, "We've passed the final hurdle, and we are ready to move ahead with the project. On-campus housing at Coastal will be a reality."

The complex will be built at no cost to taxpayers. Construction will be financed by \$5 million in revenue bonds which will be repaid to the state with funds generated from student housing fees. Six three-floor, apartment-style residence halls will house approximately 425 students and will be supervised by a resident manager and six resident assistants. Ground will be broken in late summer and the tentative completion date is August 1987.

Chancellor Eaglin said the decision was a "tremendous vote of confidence in Coastal. It shows that the state recognizes us as an institution that is on the move and an institution that can control its own destiny." He added that on-campus housing will enable the college to better serve the students by providing an atmosphere conducive to college life. "It will establish a nucleus for campus-oriented programs that will give students an opportunity to make the most of their college experience."

# EXERCISE CAUTION AS WORK BEGINS ON EXTERIORS OF CAMPUS BUILDINGS
