# FREE TUTORING IN READING OFFERED THROUGH GRADUATE READING PRACTICUM

Students in kindergarten through grade 12 who have reading problems can receive free tutoring this summer through the Graduate Reading Practicum at Coastal. The program runs July 16 through August 14. Students will meet individually with their tutors Monday through Thursday for one hour each day. ### COASTAL CAROLINA PEOPLE

o DR. ROY TALBERT, associate professor of history, has an article in the recent issue of The Proceedings of the South Carolina Historical Association. Entitled "The Antioch Scheme: Arthur Morgan's Prelude to TVA," the piece is one part of a larger story which will appear in book form next spring. Tentatively entitled FDR's Utopian: Arthur Morgan and the TVA, Talbert's book will be published by the University Press of Mississippi.

o DR. BRUNO GUJER, associate professor of history and sociology, is currently traveling in Sri Lanka and the south of India visiting with students' families and establishing contact with colleagues at area universities. He has been invited to present a lecture at the Department of Philosophy of the University of Sri Lanka at Peradeniya, Kandy on July 11. The lecture, entitled "Light and

Darkness: The Dualist Perception of Reality," will trace the role of dualist thinking in the Western intellectual tradition.

o LINDA SCHWARTZ and JILL SESSOMS, assistant professors of English, recently attended a two-day conference in Rockville, Maryland, on Critical Measurement Issues in Writing Assessment. Topics included Holistic Analysis of Writing Samples, Guidelines for Developing Topics for Testing, Assessing Higher Order Skills in Writing, and the Effects of Computers on the Writing Process.

### SUMMER THEATRE SERIES ANNOUNCED

The Department of Theatre and Speech will kick off its Summer Theatre '86 program Thursday, July 10 at 8 p.m. with Neil Simon's "The Last of the Red Hot Lovers." Called "a genuinely brilliant play' by The New York Post, the Coastal version features Thomas E. Cowart as Barney Cashman. Known as Eddie to his friends, he has been seen during the past season in "Ten Little Indians," "The Fifth of July," and "The Last Meeting of the Knights of the White Magnolia."

The three female counterparts will be played by Robin W. Edwards, Jr., recent winner of the Best Supporting Actress Award at Coastal; Susan Ramsey; and Robin Armitage-Majewski.

The play will run July 10, 11, 12, 17, 18, and 19. All performances will be held at 8 p.m. in the Little Theatre. Seating is limited to 100 and there are no reserved seats.

"Greater Tuna," the second production in the summer series, will open at 8 p.m., July 24. Originally conceived as a two-character play, this hilarious send up of small town mores is a tour-de force of quick-change artistry in costumes and characterizations. The New York Post called it "clever, inventive, fun, and downright wild."
The Coastal version will use three cast members to portray the 20 plus roles. Bob Stocks, who has been seen "Ten Little Indians," Oedipus the King," and "The Last Meeting of the Knights of the White Magnolia," will portray approximately 10 characters while Art and Caroline Trinks will do duty on the other 10. Staging will be "in the round" and all costume changes will be made on stage. "Greater Tuna" will run July 24, 25, 26, and August 1 and 2, with all performances at 8 p.m. in the Little Theatre.
