Kimbel Library now has the following newspapers available as online full-text PDFs, provided by National Newspapers Core, which includes abstracting, indexing and comprehensive full text for The Christian Science Monitor, The Los Angeles Times, The New York Times (including the NYT Book Review and NYT Magazine, as well as the Historical Collection back to 1851), The Wall Street Journal and The Washington Post. NOTE: The NYT Historical cannot be cross-searched with other newspapers. The database format makes keyword searching easy; there's no need to use the print indexes, just type and go.
