TARTUFFE AUDITIONS SET

The Department of Theatre and Speech has announced open auditions for the Coastal Carolina Theatre production of Moliere's <u>Tartuffe</u>.

Auditions will be held at 7:30 p.m. as follows: Tuesday, September 9, in the Fine Arts Little Theatre; Wednesday, September 10, in the Wheelwright Performing Arts Center; and Thursday, September 11, in the Fine Arts Little Theatre.

Tartuffe, which will be directed by David E. Majewski, is one of Moliere's most masterful and popular plays. Written in 1669, its central character is a rich bourgeois named Orgon who in middle age has become a bigot and prude. By affecting sanctity, Tartuffe, a wily opportunist and swindler, gains complete control over Orgon, who not only makes over his fortune but offers his daughter in marriage to his "spiritual" master. Only when he actually witnesses Tartuffe's attempt to seduce his wife does Orgon come to his senses.

COASTAL CAROLINA PEOPLE

o DR. ROBERT N. ROBINSON, chairman of the department of philosophy and religion, recently attended a conference in Tokyo on Far Eastern Culture, Religion, and Social Action. He was a panel respondent to several papers presented during the conference.

o DR. JAMES H. REX, vice chancellor for academic affairs, was a facilitator for an invitational two-day conference at the White Oak Conference Center near Winnsboro, SC. The first of its kind, the South Carolina Conference of Advocates for Children was funded by the Southern Education Foundation and other organizations to bring together carefully selected and knowledgeable children's advocates from throughout the state.

The conference is, in part, based on the realization that South Carolina is one of the nation's poorest states and children are often the poorest of the poor. While various groups represent

children's interests on particular subjects (such as health or education), no holistic approach exists to address the needs of the state's most vulnerable citizens. One outcome of the conference will be a white paper setting forth an action agenda formulated by the conference participants. The conference will also enable participants to assess their interest in creating a statewide coalotion of children's advocates to give ongoing attention to the issues.

o DR. SUSAN LIBES, assistant professor of marine science, was invited by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to attend its first scoping meeting to consider the environmental impact of the proposed I-95 connector. The meeting was held August 28th at Coastal.
