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RESERVED PARKING SPACES AVAILABLE

Full-time employees of the college may now "purchase" reserved parking spaces in designated areas. Generic faculty-staff parking lot areas will continue to be identified; however, the total number of spaces will be reduced. The cost is \$20 per semester, and spaces will be assigned on a first come, first served basis. They will be reserved from 8 a.m. to 1:30 pm. only.

Enforcement will be by the owner of the space who is responsible for contacting security for ticketing or towing. This will enable the owner to lend the space without danger of towing.

o Paul Banta, soccer coach, traveled during the summer to Belize in Central America as a guest of the Belize Soccer Federation and Coca Cola to run ten days of youth and senior soccer clinics. Youth clinics dealt with soccer techniques and field tactics in attack and defense. The senior player clinics for the major Division I National League Team were on advanced tactics in attack and defense and the senior goalkeeper. Banta traveled through the country making stops at several towns. He also had meetings with the president of the national soccer body and the minister of youth sports and was asked to speak on his findings during the visit. In addition, he assisted in coaching the national league champs, Coca Cola Soccer Club, who will be representing their country in the 1987 CONCACAF matches.

o Dr. Wade Baird, chairman of the Psychology Department, recently conducted an orientation and leadership workshop for members of Grand Strand Leadership VII at Wampee Plantation in Moncks Corner. STIFF PENALTIES IMPOSED FOR ILLEGAL PARKING IN HANDICAPPED SPACES

The state legislature has mandated stiffer penalties for individuals who park illegally in handicapped spaces. As of July 1, 1986, there is a mandatory \$100 dollar fine per offense. Cars may also be towed from the space and the offender will be responsible for paying the cost of towing. The alternate penalty is 30 days in jail.

Please be aware that these regulations will be enforced on campus.
