THEATRE SEASON OPENS OCTOBER 3

The 1986-87 Coastal Carolina Theatre season opens Friday, October 3 at 8 p.m. with The Wayside Motor Inn, an American comedy of contemporary relationships written by A. R. Gurney, Jr. The play will continue with performances on Saturday, October 4 at 8 p.m. and Sunday, October 5 at 2:30 p.m. all in the Wheelwright Performing Arts Center.

Directed by Dr. David E. Millard, assistant professor of English and theatre arts, The Wayside Motor Inn is a story about contemporary middle-class life in the United States. The setting is a motel outside of Boston where, on a certain evening, five distinctively American couples are found; an aging pair stopping on the way to see their grandchildren, a mother driving her reluctant son to a college interview, an ambitious doctor and his wife negotiating a legal separation, a lonely traveling salesman bantering with an opinionated waitress, and two young college students testing their compatibility. Gurney good-naturedly examines the mixed and

shared concerns and worries of the various parties in interwoven vignettes.

The cast of eleven is composed of Coastal faculty and students as well as community members. The aging couple is played by Bea Boyle of Surfside and Horace Wood, assistant professor of education. The mother and son are Glenda Sweet, assistant professor of English, and Steve Lane, a Coastal student. Claudia Cleary, assistant professor of philosophy, and Bob Nale, assistant professor of business, portray the doctor and his wife. The salesman and waitress are David E. Majewski, instructor of theatre, and Linda Hollandsworth, instructor of English. And finally, the two college students are portrayed by Robin Armitage-Majewski, instructor of speech, and Mark Andreotti, a Coastal student.

Tickets are \$5 and may be purchased at the door or in advance through the Wheelwright Box Office.

FACULTY ADVISORS NAMED FOR STUDENT MEDIA ORGANIZATIONS

Faculty advisors to student media organizations for the 1986-87 year have been appointed. Glenda Sweet is the advisor to Archarios, the college's literary magazine; Dr. Joan Piroch will serve as advisor to the yearbook, the Atheneum; and Linda Schwartz and Dr. Jack Riley are co-advisors to the student newspaper, the Chanticleer. In the role as advisor, each faculty member will work closely with student editors regarding budget, staff selection and training, and production. In addition, the advisors serve as voting members of the Student Media Committee.

STUDENT MEDIA COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Dr. Sally Hare has been appointed as faculty-member-at-large of the 1986-87 Student Media Committee. Cathy McPherson, director of public relations, has also been named to the committee. The group is chaired by Pat Sibingleton, director of student activities. Other members include Paul Orr, editor of the Archarios, Mark Porter, editor of the Atheneum, and Richard Weldon, editor of the Chanticleer.

COASTAL CAROLINA PEOPLE

o Tom Boyd, associate professor of psychology, recently attended the joint conference of the North and South Carolina Societies for Clinical Hypnosis in Charlotte. The conference featured advanced workshops in a number of areas of hypnosis including surgical and dental applications, special problems in habit control, post-hypnotic suggestion and headache control. Boyd is a member of the South Carolina society and a graduate of the introductory, intermediate, and advanced training programs conducted by the Associate Trainers in Clinical Hypnosis of New York.

o Dr. Roy Talbert, Jr., associate professor of history, has been appointed to the executive committee of the Board of Directors of the South Carolina Committee for the Humanities. The committee is the state-based agency of the National Endowment for the Humanities and is responsible for judging and awarding grants in the humanities in South Carolina. Talbert has been a director since 1984.

o Dr. Dennis Wiseman, dean of the School of Education, was recently elected chairman of the South Carolina Council of Education Deans. The council is an organization composed of the deans or department chairs of schools of education from the 11 state-supported institutions in South Carolina.

o Dr. Robert N. Robinson, chairman of the Department of Philosophy and Religion, attended the international conference on "Truth, Liberty, and Religion" in Oxford, England this summer. He also was a delegate to the bi-centenary celebration of Manchester College.

o Thomas E. Jones, director of the Wheelwright Performing Arts Center and assistant professor of theatre and speech, recently attended the fall meeting of the Southern Atlantic States Association for Asian and African Studies held at Lenoir-Rhyne College in Hickory, NC.

Members of the consortia may apply for annual minigrants to underwrite international activities on member campuses. The group also offers its film and slide collection to enhance courses on Asia and Africa and nomination of new films is solicited from the membership. This was the purpose of the most recent meeting. Scholarships and seminars are customarily offered to faculty and students as well as for the Semester-in-India program.

The consortia is dedicated to the intellectual and professional

growth of its members and is responsive to the climate and needs of international studies. It also serves as a gathering place for internationalists in this region. Jones serves on the Educational Resources Committee for the organization.

CALL FOR PAPERS ISSUED FOR SPRING CONFERENCE

The South Carolina Women in Higher Education Administration has issued a call for papers for their seventh annual conference "A Gender at Risk" which will be held April 2-3 in Myrtle Beach.

Proposals for the conference are now being accepted for workshops, seminars and discussion groups, one hour in length. Appropriate topics include women's studies, women's health issues, the environment, social action, education, science, aging, spirituality, power, politics, and psychology. The deadline for proposals is October 15, 1986.
