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

COASTAL GRADS EARN HIGHEST PASS RATE ON STATE CPA EXAM

Data released by the State Board of Accountancy on the results of the November 1985 Certified Public Accounting Exam shows that among undergraduate degree participants who were taking the exam for the first time, Coastal Carolina College had the highest pass rate of all colleges represented.

The state board presents statistics on baccalaureate degree graduates from schools that have five or more graduates taking the exam. Schools represented in the November cycle, in addition to Coastal, were USC-Columbia, Clemson, Furman, Winthrop, College of Charleston, Bob Jones University, and USC Spartanburg.

The CPA exam includes sections on auditing, law, theory, and practice. Among students who were taking the exam for the first time, 67% of the Coastal Carolina graduates passed all four parts. No other school in the state had a pass rate in excess of 30%

The CPA exam is given twice each year. Students receive a separate grade on each portion of the exam. A grade of 75% is required in order

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to pass. Those sections of the exam that are not passed on the first attempt may be repeated at a later date.

"THE REHNQUIST COURT" TO BE TOPIC OF LECTURE

Dr. Bradford P. Wilson, research associate to the Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court, will speak on "The Rehnquist Court" Wednesday, October 15 from 10:30 a.m. to noon in the Student Center

As research associate, Dr. Wilson supports the Chief Justice in his capacities as chief administrator of the federal judicial system. He is currently on professional leave from California State University at San Bernadino where he is an associate professor of political science.

Since 1982, Dr. Wilson has been editor of <u>Interpretation: A Journal</u> of <u>Political Philosophy</u>. He is also the author of a book, <u>Enforcing the</u> <u>Fourth Amendment: A Jurisprudential</u> <u>History</u> which was published this year and has written numerous articles for law reviews and other

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professional publications.

Dr. Wilson is a member of the Board of Editors and consultant to the "New Federalist Papers;" a member of the National Board of Advisers for the Federalist Society for Law and Public Studies; and a script consultant for the Bicentennial of the Constitution, News and English Broadcast Division, Voice of America.

He holds a Ph.D. in Politics from The Catholic University of America, an M.A. in Political Science from Northern Illinois University, and a B.A. in Politics from North Carolina State University.
