CONFERENCE ON FACULTY DEVELOPMENT IN THE SMALL COLLEGE TO BE HELD AT COASTAL

The Conference on Faculty
Development in the Small College
will be held November 7-8 at
Coastal. This regional conference
provides the opportunity for
faculty members and administrators
to address the unique issues and
concerns of faculty development in
the small college or university
setting. Conference presenters
come from a vast number of academic
settings from throughout the
Southeast.

Twenty-two sessions are offered and are geared to entry level--from the non-tenured faculty member to the university president. Topics include strategies in faculty development implemented by presidents, vice presidents and deans; curriculum development; enhancement of teacher effectiveness; grant writing and development; academic publishing; and microcomputers in faculty development.

Featured at the conference are two think tanks which address current issues: women and black faculty in the small college, and perspectives on faculty development from top administrators. These think tanks provide the opportunity for all conferees to attend and participate with panelists on these thought provoking topics.

HURRICANE/TORNADO ALERT PLAN

This proposal is intended to advise faculty, staff, and students on safety and evacuation procedures in the event of a natural disaster.

The following is a list of terminology:

TORNADO/HURRICANE WATCH-Broadcast over radio and television. It means conditions are favorable for a storm.

TORNADO/HURRICANE WARNING-Storm is approaching or has struck the area.

ALL CLEAR-Issued by the National Weather Bureau only and announced by radio and television.

In the event of an issued watch, all personnel should continue normal activities and stay informed of updated weather reports. The Public Safety Lieutenant will monitor all offical weather statements and keep the chancellor informed of all changes.

In the event of a warning issued by the weather service, the following steps will be implemented during regular working hours:

-The Chancellor's Office will contact all department secretaries and/or deans and relay the status of the disaster.

-The Personnel Office will contact the Governor's Office and relay information concerning the storm. -The Director of Physical Services will mobilize all available maintenance personnel and secure the campus.

-Campus Security will contact all police agencies and ensure that the campus is secure. One officer shall remain in or near the security house at all times. -The Office of Student Development will contact the necessary local officials to determine the nearest available evacuation shelter. When this information is available, all housing managers of student housing should be advised. This information will also be transferred to the Director of Public Relations. -The Director of Public Relations will inform all area radio and TV stations of evacuation centers available for students, faculty,

If a storm warning is issued before normal working hours, the vice chancellor for academic affairs will determine the necessity to cancel classes. However, all classified state employees should report to work if possible.

-The switchboard will remain open

during regular hours.

NATIONAL MARIONETTE THEATRE TO PERFORM AT COASTAL CAROLINA

The National Marionette Theatre will present "Aladdin and his Wonderful Lamp" Tuesday, October 28, 8 p.m. at USC Coastal Carolina College in the Wheelwright Performing Arts Center.

The production, accompanied by the music of Rimsky-Korsakov and Borodin, follows the exciting adventures of Aladdin in this lavishly produced Arabian Nights classic. Imaginative full-stage sets, special lighting, and effects are used to transport the audience into a Middle Eastern world of magic, enchantment, and high adventure.

David Syrotiak, artistic director of the company, has been credited with reviving the classic art of the marionette in the United States. Under his direction, the National Marionette Theatre has won numerous awards, including a citation of excellence from the Union International de la Marionette. It is the first American marionette company to win this award. "Puppetry is a synthesis of the arts," says Syrotiak. "And the puppet itself, it is at once an Everyman with no limitations...it is the crystalization of the imagination of the puppeteer."

The program is presented by the Wheelwright Council for the Performing Arts and Coastal Carolina College with financial support from the Coastal Educational Foundation.
