

LEADERSHIP ACADEMY MEETS ON CAMPUS

The South Carolina Administrator's Leadership Academy held a workshop on principal and teacher evaluation at Coastal October 23 and 24. The Academy was created several years ago to provide advanced training to South Carolina Public School principals, superintendents, and vocational directors. It offers seminars in management skills, instructional leadership skills and current issues in education throughout the year. The SC Academy has assisted more than 40 states in designing training programs during the past several years, according to a February 1986 report to the state board of education.

The workshop at Coastal was sponsored by the Coastal Education Consortium which is comprised of the school districts of Horry, Georgetown, and Williamsburg counties; Coastal Carolina College, Horry-Georgetown Technical College, and Williamsburg Technical College.

- o Dr. Douglas Nelson, professor of Marine Science, has received a \$13,000 research contract from South Carolina Coastal Council to survey beach erosion between Little River and North Inlet. Many of the Marine Science students will be assisting in the data collection. The information gathered will be used by Coastal Council in making beach development decisions. making use of the data for a feasibility study of beach renourishment.
