This information is based on a standard format that each operator has at the switchboard. The information will then be relayed to the Law Enforcement and Safety Department via radio or telephone.

# DEADLINE FOR "WHO'S WHO" APPROACHING

The Student Affairs Committee has mailed invitations to all students who are eligible for election to Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges. To be eligible for consideration, a student must: have a GPR of 3.0 or above; have completed 60 or more hours; be currently enrolled for 12 hours; have attended Coastal for a nimimum of two semesters with a GPR of #.0; and be or have been involved in cocurricular and community activities.
