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

KIMBEL LECTURE TO BE HELD DEC.8

The Kimbel Lecture Series will present a lecture by broadcast journalist Robert MacNeil, Monday, December 8, 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. His topic will be "The Media and World Events." MacNeil is co-anchor of the Public Broadcasting System's "MacNeil/ Lehrer NewsHour."

A native of Canada, MacNeil joined the London bureau of Rueters News Service in 1955 where he worked for five years. In 1960, he joined NBC-TV as a foreign correspondent based in London. He covered many of the major international events of the early 1960's including the civil war in Algeria, the Cold War confrontation resulting from the construction of the Berlin Wall, and the Cuban missile crisis. Transferring to the Washington bureau in 1963, he covered the civil rights movement and the White House. From Dallas, Texas, he contributed to NBC's continuous coverage of the assassination of President Kennedy.

MacNeil also covered major news events such as the resignation of French President Charles DeGaulle, the 1968 Democratic National Convention in Chicago, and the assassinations of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Senator Robert Kennedy.

In 1973, he teamed with James Lehrer for the first time in live coverage of the Senate Watergate hearings for PBS. Their coverage won an Emmy Award.

The "Robert MacNeil Report" first aired on WNET in New York in 1975. Less than a year later it became "The MacNeil/Lehrer Report" and was aired nationally on PBS. It has won more than 30 awards for excellence in journalism.

COASTAL CAROLINA THEATRE TO PRESENT BRIGHTON BEACH MEMOIRS DEC. 5-7

Playwright Neil Simon has written a love letter to the past in his play "Brighton Beach Memoirs" which will be presented by Coastal Carolina Theatre December 5 and 6 at 8 p.m. and December 7 at 2:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

The story is set in 1937, and the family of the 15-year-old narrator, Eugene (played by Coastal junior David Russell) is caught up in many of the dilemmas common to lower middle-class families in Brighton Beach, New York during the Depression. His father (played by freshman Mike Evans) is attempting to hold down two jobs; his mother (played by Vicki Hanley, the only non-student performer in the cast)

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is torn between protecting her widowed sister, Blanche (Renee Kotsovos, a junior) and her frail daughter (senior Rebekah Browne) and her two sons (the older of whom is played by sophomore Jason Poole). While Blanche is caught up in her own problems, she is attempting to deal with her 16-year-old daughter Nora (junior Cathy Callahan), an aspiring actress.

The production is directed by Linda Hollandsworth.

o Dr. James Rex, vice chancellor for academic affairs, attended the Southeast Regional Policy Workshop in Atlanta last week. The Center for Policy Research in Education at

Rutgers University sponsored the workshop and invited a group of state education policy-makers from Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, and South Carolina to discuss recent reforms undertaken in the Southeastern states and throughout the nation. The Center for Policy Research in Education is funded by the U.S. Department of Education. Lindy Smith has left her position in the Records Office to attend graduate school full-time. STUDENT HEALTH INFO SERVICE INITIATED

A Student Health Information
Service (SHIS) has been initiated
at Coastal by the administration in
cooperation with the Student
Government Association. The
service will provide students with
information about existing
community health services and
practitioners and will provide
general medical information about
student health concerns. There is
no charge; however, the cost of any
health care is the responsibility
of the student.

Tom Wiemken has been appointed coordinator of the service. A former medical corpsman in the Air Force, Wiemken is an emergency medical technician and a CPR/first aid instructor. In 1983, he graduated from the Medical University of South Carolina as a physician's assistant.

SHIS will be part of the Office of Counseling Services and will be supervised by Dr. Joseph Mazurkiewicz in cooperation with Butch Fennell. Presently, Fennell provides health care referral information and athletic treatment to students while the Office of Security administers the college's medical emergency procedure which arranges for transport of students to Conway Hospital. The increased number of athletic teams and the requirement that Fennell accompany teams on away trips has necessitated an interim service prior to the planned on-campus student health care service that will be in place when the residence halls open.

SHIS is located on the second floor of the Student Center in room 202, telephone extension 2327. Hours are 8:30 a.m. to 10 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Should a students require health information at other times, they should contact Counseling Services, ext. 2305.
