COASTAL CAROLINA PEOPLE

o Drs. James Branham, James Farsolas, Bruno Gujer, Roy Talbert, and John Vrooman of the History Department, attended the Southern Historical Association convention in Charlotte November 12-15.

o Dr. James Branham, professor of history, attended the South Carolina History Day Conference November 20 at the State House and the Governor's Mansion in Columbia.

o Steve Nagle, assistant professor of English, has been appointed chair of the program committee for the Southeastern Conference on Linguistics (SECOL). He will be charged with selecting presentations for SECOL XXXVI in Georgetown, DC in March 1987 and SECOL XXXVII in Atlanta in November 1987.

o Dr. Milene Megel, dean of nursing, has had an article accepted for publication in the Journal of Nursing Administration & Nurse Educator. The article is entitled "Applying for an Executive Position in Nursing Education."

o Dr. James Farsolas, associate professor of history, recently attended the 18th National Convention of the American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies (AAASS) held in New Orleans. He participated in the panel on "Reform and Revolution in Southeastern Europe during the First Half of the 19th Century" and presented a paper entitled "Serbian-Greek Relations in a Revolutionary Context: Milosh Obrenovich and the Philike Hetairia, 1817-1921."

o Dr. Walter Van Hamme, assistant professor of physics and astronomy, presented a lecture "Halley's Comet One Year Later" in the Public Lecture Series of the Baruch Institute. He talked about the various space missions to the comet and discussed some of the first exciting results.

o Dr. Beth Haynes, assistant professor of economics, attended the seminar "Improving College Teaching" conducted by the Center for Faculty Evaluation and Development of Kansas State University. The seminar was held November 12-14 in Georgetown, DC.

o Drs. Dennis Wiseman, Gilbert Hunt, and Lance Bedwell of the School of Education, have recently had their manuscript, "Teaching Critical Thinking," accepted for printing with the ERIC documents in the ERIC Clearinghouse on Teacher Education. The paper is available in both microfiche and hard copy.

o Lelia Smalley, of the Music Department, has recently returned from a symposium of the National Conference on Piano Pedagogy, held at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. Participants included college professors and music educators from throughout North America and Europe who are interested in encouraging and promoting the undergraduate and graduate education of the professional collegiate and independent piano teacher.

o Zdzislaw Sikora, associate professor of art, has been informed that his print "Flora 5" has been accepted for exhibition in the 39th North American Print Exhibition" sponsored by the Boston Printmakers Society. The exhibition will hang from January 18 through February 25 at the Danforth Museum in Farmingham, Massachusetts. The juror was Andrew Stasik, director of the International Graphic Arts Foundation and the Silvermine Guild Art Center in New Canaan Connecticut.

o The Music Educators National Conference (Pam Muise, local chapter president) presented Brown Bradley in a vocal workshop in the Little Theatre on November 12. Bradley is new to the area, having

moved to Myrtle Beach from New York where he had earned an enviable reputation as a tenor soloist and coach. He is currently on the faculty at Coastal Academy. Bradley lectured on vocal production and then demonstrated his talk with two singers from Janet Inman's studio: Donna Small and Wendy Adams.
