## BILLY TAYLOR TRIO TO PERFORM IN WHEELWRIGHT

The Billy Taylor Trio, a group of internationally known jazz musicians, will perform Tuesday, February 10 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Dr. Billy Taylor, famed jazz pianist, will perform with percussionist Freddie Waits and bassist Victor Gaskin.



Dr. Taylor has spent a lifetime in jazz. Through his accomplishments as a pianist, composer, arranger, conductor, lecturer, and author, he has become one of the most respected and articulate spokesmen for jazz -- "America's classical music," as Dr. Taylor defines it.

In addition to his position as artistic director and on-air music correspondent of CBS-TV's program "Sunday Morning," Dr. Taylor was musical director of the award-winning "David Frost Show" and also produced and hosted his own jazz series on New York's channel 47. For public television, he completed two specials -- "Swingin' the Blues," a four-part series on jazz in Kansas City, and "Salute to the Duke" celebrating the music of Duke Ellington. In addition, Dr. Taylor has been a contributing editor to PBS-TV's "Black Journal," and NBC's "Sunday Show."

Dr. Taylor earned his Ph.D. in education from the University of Massachusetts, and regularly combines performances with lectures, workshops, and master classes at 30 universities each year.

The concert is sponsored by the college's Cultural Arts Series. Tickets are \$5 (\$3 for students) and are available through the Wheelwright Box Office.

#### **DR. JOYCE BROTHERS TO BE A KIMBEL LECTURER**

The Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series will present a free lecture by Dr. Joyce Brothers Tuesday, February 17, 8 p.m. in the Wheelwright Auditorium. The noted psychologist, columnist, author, and business consultant will speak on "Making Love Last a Lifetime."

Recognition of Dr. Brothers' accomplishments has come from many quarters. Most recently, and for the sixth year, she has been listed in George Gallup's annual poll of "most admired women." A United

Press International poll named her one of the 10 most influential American women, and a survey conducted by the Greenwich College Research Center, listed her among the 10 women most admired by college students. Still another poll, conducted by Good Housekeeping magazine to find "Women in the World Most Admired by Women" ranked Dr. Brothers in a 10th place tie with Golda Meir of Israel.

For six years, Dr. Brothers was a member of the faculties of Hunter College and Columbia University in New York City. She is now a frequent guest lecturer at colleges and universities across the country.

Her lecture at Coastal is presented by the Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series which is sponsored by the Kimbel Trust, the Episcopal Diocese of South Carolina, the Sun News, the Burroughs Foundation, the Coastal Educational Foundation and USC Coastal Carolina College. The lecture series was created in memory of the late William A. and Maude Kimbel who were devoted and generous benefactors to Coastal Carolina College and the Waccamaw/Grand Strand region.

#### **OPERA CAROLINA TO PRESENT "SCHOOL FOR LOVERS"**

Opera Carolina, the Southeast's largest musical-theatre touring company, will present School for Lovers, Tuesday, February 24, 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. This performance is sponsored by the Wheelwright Council for the Arts.

School for Lovers, an adaptation of Mozart's "Cosi Fan Tutte," is set in the Old South after the War Between the States. The story involves two young men, Freddy and William. They make a wager with their old friend Alfonso, that if they were to go off to join the cavalry, but instead return in disguise as carpetbaggers and woo



each other's sweethearts, the girls would remain faithful. With delightful music and ironic satire, the plot of School for Lovers is full of surprises, disguises and tricks.

o **Jim Henderson**, associate professor of government and international studies, served on a panel at the annual meeting of the American Historical Association. The panel, titled "Teaching the Survey of Latin American Civilization, What Works? What Doesn't?" was sponsored by the Conference on Latin American History. Henderson was recently appointed to a three-year term on the Teaching Materials Committee of the conference.
