THE GEORGETOWN YOUTH ASSOCIATION MAKES DONATION TO GCHEC

The Georgetown County Higher Education Commission recently received an unrestricted grant of \$10,000 from the Youth Association. The Youth Association was organized in the 1960's to provide recreational activities for the youth of Georgetown before such services were provided by the County government. They purchased land and a building which were later sold to the local government and the money invested. Mrs. Virginia Skinner, a former school teacher and a member of Georgetown County School Board, said that in accordance with the now defunct group's constitution the accumulated monies were required to be donated to worthy non-profit and/or charitable organizations.

The monies were distributed as follows: \$100,000 to County government to be applied toward restoration of the Extension Center Auditorium; \$10,000 to Georgetown Recreation Department; \$10,000 to Georgetown Hospital; and an unrestricted \$10,000 gift to Georgetown County Higher Education Commission. The funds received by the Commission will ultimately be used for scholarships and other services at the Georgetown Extension of Coastal Carolina College.

## COASTAL CAROLINA PEOPLE

o **Dr. Milene A. Megel**, dean of nursing, has resigned her position and will be leaving in March. Megel has taken the position of executive secretary for the New York State Board for Nursing in Albany, New York.

o Dr. Sandra P. Bowden, assistant professor of secondary education, has been appointed to the Writing Advisory Committee for the Education Entrance Examination (EEE) by the State Department of Education. Bowden will attend a March 12-14 meeting in Columbia at which the committee will score and discuss a sample of papers for use in training Educational Testing Service scorers.

o Dr. Richard Dame, professor of marine scinece, was an invited participant at an NSF/NASA workshop on remote sensing (satellite image interpretation) and landscape ecology at the University of New Mexico's Technical Application Center in Albuquerque. At the workshop, Dame's task was the ecological interpretation of satellite images of the freshwater, salt water, forest, and marshland environments of North Inlet and lower Waccamaw Neck. Once interpreted, these images were computer enhanced to produce detail color maps of typical SC coastal habitats.

o Dr. Ballou Skinner, professor of physics, has been awarded a curriculum development grant by the Horry County Higher Education Commission for the funding of "The Mechanical Universe Video Tapes." The 52 tapes will be used as supplementary material for courses in physics and astronomy. The tapes were produced by the California Institute of Technology.

o Barbara J. Driver and Linda Henderson, both assistant professors of accounting, recently attended the annual meeting of the SC Association of Accounting Instructors in Charlotte, NC. Driver was elected vice-president of the association at the meeting.

o Zdzislaw Sikora, associate professor of art, has contracted to present a one-man show of recent prints with the J. Noblett Gallery this coming September. The show will be a major exhibition of his full "Flora Suite," with 25 new images on display. J. Noblett Gallery is in Sonoma, California, and is his exclusive representative in California. This is his first one-man show with them.

Also, Sikora is one of several artists whose prints will be on display in the Milliken Gallery, Converse College, Spartanburg, SC starting February 19 through March 18.

o Ed Cerny, assistant professor of business administration, will appear on "Grand Strand Gazette" (TV-13) Sunday, February 22, 10:30 a.m., to discuss advertising. He will also speak at the South Strand Sertoma Club at Luvan's Fish Camp in Garden City on Wednesday, April 15 at 7 a.m. The topic will be "Nutrition and Exercise."

Cerny was a guest on TV-43 Nightline, Friday, February 6 at 8 p.m. He discussed the Fellowship of Christian Athletes chapter here at Coastal. He also spoke to the Grand Strand Sertoma Club on Tuesday, February 10, at Mary Jewel's Restaurant in Myrtle Beach. His subject was the "Business Internship Program at Coastal."

o Cenita Gerald, admissions counselor, and Sha-Ron Jones, Director of Minority Student Relations, served as coordinators for the Career Development program held last week at West Conway Middle School as part of the local schedule of events celebrating Black History month. The program included representatives from many schools including predominantly Black colleges and universities in South and North Carolina who shared information about college life.

o Dr. Walter Van Hamme, assistant professor of physics and astronomy, has been awarded a Research and Productive Scholarship grant by the University of South Carolina, in support of a research project entitled "Simultaneous Light and Radial Velocity Curve Solutions for Selected Contact Binaries," and he received a research grant of the American Astronomical Society in support for the same project. He also has been selected to participate in the University Faculty Exchange Program for Summer II, 1987, to conduct research at the Columbia Campus.

Dr. Van Hamme recently attended

the 169th meeting of the American Astronomical Society in Pasadena, California. Hosts for the meeting were the Mount Wilson and Las Campanas Observatories of the Carnegie Institute of Washington, the California Institute of Technology, and the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. At the meeting, the latest discoveries in astronomy were presented. Van Hamme attended sessions on close binary systems, his field of specialty, and on planetary exploration. Here, the results of the Voyager Uranus flyby and the various space missions to Comet Halley were discussed.
