## **JAMES DICKEY TO GIVE READING AND LECTURE IN WHEELWRIGHT**

Poet and novelist James Dickey will give a reading and lecture Friday, March 6 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

A professor of English at USC, Dickey is considered among the most impressive of the American writers who came to prominence in the decade of the 1960's. In the eleven years from 1960 to 1970, he published seven volumes of verse, three volumes of literary criticism, a book of **Self-Interviews**, and the novel **Deliverance**.

His first Book, **Into the Stone**, (1960) brought him the recognition that enabled him to become a teaching poet. In addition to his position at USC, he has held appointments at Reed College, San Fernando Valley State College, and the University of Wisconsin. He received the National Book Award for **Buckdancer's Choice** (1965) and for two years was Consultant in Poetry to the Library of Congress.

The program is sponsored by the college, the School of Humanities, and the students of Sigma Tau Delta. The program is free and open to the public.

## **SINGER MARLENA MCGHEE TO PERFORM IN WHEELWRIGHT**

Vocalist Marlena McGhee will perform in Wheelwright Auditorium Wednesday, March 4, at 8 p.m.

A well-known singer from the low country of South Carolina, McGhee

has developed an international reputation. In 1980, she was the national soloist for the A.M.E. Zion Methodist Church representing the U.S. in England where she performed for the Queen. McGhee has appeared in concert throughout the U.S. and Europe. She currently serves as National Music Director for the A.M.E. Zion Methodist Lay Council. Her new album of sacred music with full orchestration will be released soon.

The program is sponsored by the Afro-Am student organization and the Office of Minority Students Relations as part of their continuing series of programs celebrating the achievements of Black Americans. It is free and open to the public.
