PRESIDENT HOLDERMAN ANNOUNCES THE NAMING OF THE E. CRAIG WALL, SR. SCHOOL OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

Dr. James Holderman announced during the Founders Day Convocation that Coastal's School of Business Administration and the proposed business administration building will be named in honor E. Craig Wall, Sr.

"Whose name can be better identified with the dynamic growth of this area." President Holderman said. "Craig Wall Sr. left us prematurely, but he left behind a record of service unparalleled. The USC Board of Trustees in collaboration with the leadership at Coastal wanted to insure the immortality of the impact of this man." This is only the second time the University has named a college and a building for the same individual.

A charter member of the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc., Mr. Wall was instrumental in the development of the college, in securing land for the campus, and in supporting the expansion of campus facilities. He was chairman of the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education from 1967 to 1971. Mr. Wall became Director Emeritus of the Foundation in 1982.

He was the founder of Canal Industries, Inc., a forest industry whose subsidiaries today own more than 300,000 acres of land in five Southeastern States with 1,200 employees. Mr. Wall died in 1985.

GENETIC ENGINEERING CRITIC TO SPEAK AT COASTAL CAROLINA COLLEGE

One of the nation's leading critics of genetic engineering and nuclear technology, Jeremy Rifkin, will present several day and evening lectures, free of charge, at Coastal Monday, March 23.

Rifkin has devoted nearly two decades to examining the relationship between ethics, science, technology, economics, and public policy. He has served as a consultant to congressional committees, industry, and labor, on emerging trends and future issues. He is best known as a critic of genetic engineering, and his lectures deal with the social, economic, ethical, and environmental implications of the transition from the Industrial Age to the Age of Biotechnology. He is the author of eight books that have been translated into twelve languages.

Rifkin has been featured in <u>Time</u>, <u>Newsweek</u>, <u>The Washington Post</u>, and <u>The New York Times</u> and has appeared on numerous television shows including "The Today Show," "ABC Nightline," and "20/20." He is the president of the Foundation on Economic Trends, Washington, DC. The lecture is sponsored by the Office of International Programs.
