"THE ROYAL FAMILY" TO BE PRESENTED AT COASTAL

The North Carolina School for the Arts will present the George S. Kaufman - Edna Ferber comedy, "The Royal Family," Wednesday, April 8 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

This 1920's comedy is about an American family of stage and screen actors. Although the writers denied that their play was based on the real-life Barrymore family, the public and the Barrymores disputed their contention.

"The Royal Family" features Myrtle Beach native Birgit Darby in the role of the ingenue Gwen. Miss Darby, the daughter of William E. Darby and Birgit H. Darby, is a member of the Senior Repertory Company of the North Carolina School of the Arts. She is a 1979 graduate of Myrtle Beach High School and attended Coastal Carolina before transferring the North Carolina.

"The Royal Family" is sponsored by the Wheelwright Council for the Performing Arts at Coastal Carolina College. Tickets are \$7 for general admission, \$5 for students, and are available through the Wheelwright Box Office.

Rod Gragg, of Palmetto Public Relations, will serve as moderator. The panelists are Terry Barnett, associate professor of chemistry; Deborah Codella, senior; Charles Parrish, senior; Connie Vermont, junior; and Steve West, assistant professor of mathematics.

The Forum provides an opportunity for open discussion and debate of topics of current interest to the campus community. All students, faculty, and administrators are invited to attend. Audience participation in the discussion will be strongly encouraged.

COASTAL CAROLINA PEOPLE

o Dr. Randall A. Wells, associate professor of English, evaluated the proposed McGraw-Hill Reader, third edition, for McGraw-Hill Book Company.

o Jacqueline L. Gmuca, assistant professor of English, recently attended the Conference on College Composition and Communication, March 18-21 in Atlanta. At the conference she served as chairperson for the session "On Imitation"; participated in an all-day workshop, "Studying Cognitive Processes in the Classroom"; and attended the national meeting of Writing Project directors.

o Thomas E. Jones, director of Wheelwright Auditorium, has just returned from the spring meeting of the South Carolina Consortium for International Studies that was held at Columbia College in Columbia. Jones represents Coastal as one of the founding members of the group that has representation from fourteen colleges in the state. He serves on the Educational Resources Committee for the Consortia.

o Dr. Richard Dame, professor of marine science, was recently invited by the National Science Foundation to serve on a panel to review and judge proposals for the Research Experiences for Undergraduates (REU) program. A typical REU proposal requests funds for eight to ten undergraduates for a summer or a year. The goal of this program is to ensure an adequate supply of high quality mathematicians, scientists, and engineers for the future. It is widely believed that hands-on experience in active research is one of the most effective techniques for training undergraduates in these areas. NSF will commit approximately nine million dollars to the

REU program during fiscal year 1987.

o Dr. Douglas Nelson, associate professor of marine science and geology, recently presented an invited paper at the Southeastern Section meeting of the Geological Society of America in Norfolk, Virginia. The presentation was entitled "Origin and Reworking of Inner Continental Shelf Sediment, Northern South Carolina." It was one of the invited papers in a symposium on Atlantic shelf sediment origin and deposition. The research results were obtained from a detailed study of the sediments from Myrtle Beach to Georgetown and extended 17 miles offshore. A series of deposits have been preserved which document the southerly migration of the Pee Dee River from Murrells Inlet to Winyah Bay.
