## Coastal Carolina People

o Dr. Richard Collin, associate professor of political science, was recently notified that the Carolina Venture Fund Committee is making a contribution to his research into the origins of Italian Red Brigade terrorism. Collin was awarded \$1,523 to cover his airfare to Rome, where he will conduct interviews with both Italian terrorists who are now in prison, and with some of the policemen who put them there. This research project is part of a continuing interest of his into political violence.

Millus lectures at the college on Medieval and Renaissance literature and on writing. He is author of A

Contemplative Fishing Guide to the Grand Strand, published by Sandlapper Press. His latest book, Fishing the Southeast Coast, is scheduled for publication by Sandlapper this fall.

o Steve Nagle, assistant professor of English, had an article entitled "Why Business English is not English for Specific Purposes" appear in "Lingue, Tecnologie e Unione Europea," the proceedings of the international conference of the same name.

o Zdzislaw Sikora, associate professor of art, was invited to participate in "New Directions in Southeastern Art: Prints and Artist's Books." This is a slide show and exhibition of actual works to be presented at the 1987 annual meeting of the Southeastern College Art Conference at the University of Tennessee; Knoxville, TN. ### Coastal Consolidates Academic Schools

Dr. James Rex, vice chancellor for Academic Affairs at USC Coastal Carolina College has announced the consolidation of the college's seven academic schools to four schools.

According to Dr. Rex, the changes were made to strengthen the administrative structure to better accommodate Coastal's expected growth. "Coastal Carolina has reached a point in its growth where the organizational structure for our academic programs needed substantial revisions," he said. "We have created two

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professional schools and two schools for the arts and sciences. The changes reflect a more efficient and effective structure which will strengthen the administrative role of the four deans while also strengthening the autonomy and identity of individual academic departments. It also enables us to add important support services for faculty and students." The reorganization was completed by internal reassignment of existing personnel.

The newly created divisions are the E. Craig Wall School of Business Administration and Computer Science, the School of Education and Health Professions, the School of Humanities and Fine Arts, and the School of Natural and Applied Sciences.

Business Administration and Computer Science will be headed by Dr. J. Dale Molander who was dean of the School of Business. Dr. Joseph Cicero, the former dean of Mathematics and Computer Science, has accepted the position as chair for the Department of Computer Science. In addition to the traditional role of department chair, Dr. Cicero will have leadership responsibility for designing a state-of-the-art computer facility for the new E. Craig Wall, Sr. School of Business. Dr. Cicero will also head a number of economic development out-reach programs. James F. Eason will continue as assistant dean and Edward R. Cerny will serve as director of the MBA and Internship programs.

The School of Education and Health Professions will be led by Dr. Dennis Wiseman, former dean of the School of Education. The scope of this academic area has been broadened to include nursing. Dr. Marshall Parker will continue as assistant dean and chair of the department of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation. Dr. Sandra Bowden has been named director of Field Services and Special Projects. Other department chairs in this area are Patricia Kirkland, nursing; Dr. Gilbert H. Hunt, early childhood and elementary education; and Dr. Lance E. Bedwell, secondary education.

Dr. John B. Durrell will continue as Dean of the School of Humanities and Fine Arts. Dr. David E. Millard has accepted the position of assistant dean. The Department of History has been added to this area and will continue to be chaired by James Branham. Other department chairs are: Martha B. Thomas, art; Carolyn G. Cox, music; Dr. Robert N. Robinson, philosophy and religion; Dr. Thomas J. Trout, English; Dr. Alvin L. Hall, foreign languages; and David A. Majewski, theatre and speech.

Dr. Elizabeth Puskar, former dean of Social and Behavioral Sciences, will become dean of the School of Natural and Applied Sciences. Department chairs in this area are: Dr. Colleen A. Lohr, biology; Dr. Richard F. Dame, marine science; Dr. Wade K. Baird, psychology and sociology; Dr. Richard O. Collin, government. The assistant dean and the chair of the Math Department have not been named.

Dr. Richard Moore, former dean of science, will become assistant vice chancellor for grants and sponsored research. An important support service for faculty and the institution, this office will actively solicit external funding from a variety of sources to support academic, scholarly, and curricular goals.

An academic testing center will also be established to diagnose the strengths and weaknesses of entering students and to help them acquire academic skills they will need to successfully complete their educational programs. Marsh Myers will head the center as assistant vice chancellor for development and registrar.

Other administrative departments heads under the vice chancellor for academic affairs will continue as before. They are: Dr. Lynne Smith, director of library services; Patricia Sizemore, assistant vice chancellor for academic administration; Dr. Sally Hare, assistant vice chancellor for continuing education and graduate studies; Stewart Strothers, director of Georgetown Education Center; Dr. Richard Koesterer, coordinator of Interdisciplinary Studies and University 101; and Stephen Nagle, director of International Studies.
