## Grenoble Students Coming to Coastal

During Summer Session II (July 13 to August 18) Coastal Carolina College will host 20 students from the University of Grenoble which is situated in the French Alps. There will be seventeen women and three men, ranging from 18 to 25 years of age, and ranking from sophomores to seniors. Although their fluency in English varies, all will follow the same special course in English designed and taught by Drs. Jill Sessoms and Gerald Groves.

This project was planned by Dr. Groves in the spring of 1986 while on a professional exchange with Dr. Philippe Jaudel of Grenoble. During that year, France and the United States mutually celebrated the restoration of the Statue of Liberty, donated by the French government in 1884, and shipped to America in 1886 on the ship Iserre which, incidentally, is the name of the department in which Grenoble is located. Since then the two countries have established the strongest mutual bond since the De Gaulle era.

Although the date of their course conforms to that of the regular Summer Session II, the French students will arrive at Coastal as early as July 1. They will stay at the Carolina Commons, with the exception of one, Veronique Sellier, who will be the guest of Dr. and Mrs. Randall Wells.

During their stay, the French students will attempt to know as many American students as possible for the purpose of learning the local culture, forming international friendships, and initiating student exchanges.
