Lewis Grizzard to Speak on Campus

Popular author and columnist Lewis Grizzard will speak on campus Tuesday, October 20 at 8 p.m. in Kimbel Gymnasium. Sponsored by the Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series, the program is free and open to the public. Seats will filled on a first-come, first-served basis, and doors will open at 7 p.m.

Born in Fort Benning, Georgia in 1946, Grizzard attended the University of Georgia where he studied journalism and worked as sports editor of the Athens Daily News. At the university, he was the recipient of a William Randolph Hearst Writing Award and a Minneapolis Star-Tribune scholarship for his journalistic skills.

Grizzard became the youngest executive sports editor of the Atlanta Journal. For several years he was the sports editor for the Chicago Sun Times before returning to Georgia as a columnist at the Atlanta Constitution. His column is syndicated nationally by King Features to over 300 newspapers with a readership of ten million.

His awards are numerous. He was awarded the Associated Press Newswriting Award; the 1978 United Press International Georgia Sports Commentator Award; Dixie Council of Authors and Journalists Award for Nonfiction Author of the Year; and was Georgia Speaker of the Year --to name a few.

He has written nine books, three of which made The New York Times and Time magazine best-seller lists. His most recent book is When my Love Returns from the Ladies' Room, Will I Be too Old to Care? He is a frequent guest on network television shows including "The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson," "Good Morning America," and "The CBS Morning News."

Dept. of Government to Present Bicentennial Series

"The Fight for the Constitution," the first in the Department of Government's series of three programs celebrating the bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution, will be held Tuesday, October 20 from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The speaker is Dr. William B. Allen of the U.S. Civil Rights Commission, one of the most tireless and articulate defenders of liberty and self-government of our time.

Along with being a devoted public servant and a former candidate for the U.S. Senate in California, Allen is a scholar of the first order. He is a professor of government at Harvey-Midd College and Claremont Graduate School, Claremont, California, where he specializes in political philosophy, American government, and jurisprudence. He also has held faculty positions at American University and University de Rouen in France, where he was a Fulbright Fellow.

He serves as program administrator for the Liberty Fund Bicentennial Project, is a member of the National Council on the Humanities, and is a consulting editor of <u>Improving College and University Teaching.</u>

His contributions to professional journals and other publications are numerous. Among his many publications are George Washington: Without Parade or Funeral Oration, The Essential Anti-Federalist, and The Works of Fisher Ames.

Dr. Stephen Krulik, professor of mathematics education at Temple University, will lecture about "Problem Solving: The Administrator's Role" on Thursday, Oct. 15, from 9 to 11:30 a.m., in Wheelwright Auditorium. Registration will be from 8:30 to 9:00 a.m.

Dr. Krulik is a nationally recognized expert in the area of problem solving education. He has taught both at the secondary and university levels and has served as a school district consultant and a presenter at state, regional, and national meetings and conferences.
